St. Petersburg, 1843. I have endeavored to gain some statistics of the people here, of men and things alike, but where they is so severe a censorship upon the press, it is groping in the dark to seek for

any truth, the investigation of which would prove morally or politically detrimental to the government. The serfs in Russia are between thirty and forty millions in number. Scarcely any of them are more free than the slaves with us, but in intelligence, in integrity, in a word, in all that is reputable and comfortable, the latter are free men compared with the mass of serfs. An estate here is valuable, not as it produces well, or is great in extent of acres, but according to the number of serfs there are upon it—all of whom, at any moment, may be transferred with the estates of the proprietor. There is a Count Cheremetoff here, the richest landed proprietor of the empire, who owns more than one hundred thousand serfs, and the amount of ownership begins from and increases to this multitude. There are good masters and there are bad ones, but goodness here must be limited only to the indifference to the real welfare of the peasant. The master has but few of the responsibilities imposed upon the American slave owner. The Government demands just so much care of a serf at the hands of a master, as will prevent him from becoming an encumbrance upon the State. The object therefore is to make the most of these people, and with the least possible trouble. A master's cost is necessary for everything. A house and patch of land are usually the temporary possession of the serf, and for the use of these labor is received by the master instead of money. Half the week belongs usually to the master, and half the time to the serf to earn his livelihood and pay his rents. Food is poor, and clothing is poor, even with agricultural serfs, who are much better off than those employed in the workshop and in domestic labor. They serve in all capacities, and from the field are often transferred to drudgery of the manufactory. The serfs not only have all the ties of domestic life to wed them even to their wretchedness, but even the cupidty of the owner encourages the earliest marriages, to add to the millions of victims, while the law, I believe, forbids the marriage of young girls under the age of sixteen. The laws applying to serfs are many, and apply to every situation of life. An owner becomes even a monopolist, if a noble, and none but a noble can become a manufacturer. With men and women the law is equally severe, and though in all cases of bondage, here the wrong is not often in practice than elsewhere, the power to enforce, it is the same. The labor of the serfs is equally with their flesh and blood the property of their masters. Self-interest, therefore, commands a protection, where a higher principle is disregarded. The power to abuse, nevertheless, remains, and the thousands of serfs I have seen, where wretchedness and dejection are written in every wrinkle of the face, is proof enough that they who are thus doomed, are often beaten with many stripes.

Commercial. HAMBURG, Nov. 6. Cotton—Since our last report, the market has been rather dull. On Thursday and Friday last a large quantity of cotton arrived here, and was disposed of at a shade lower than our former quotations. Since then, very little has arrived, and our markets has been very dull. The accounts brought by the Great Western, although they represented the Liverpool market as steady and somewhat firmer, do not show any decrease in the quantity on hand and have therefore had the tendency to cause a further decline of 1/4 cent. We quote new, from 4 1/2 to 5 1/2 and the choice article 5 1/2. Old, 4 to 5 1/2.

AUGUSTA, Nov. 7. Cotton—The market has for several days been very dull, and the business transacted has been limited. A decline has taken place since last week of from 1/4 to 1/2 cent, and buyers demand a still greater reduction. The receipts have been heavy, and the low state of our river adds to the depression of the market. We quote the extremes at from 3 1/2 to 5 1/2 cents, with remark, that a choice article only would bring the latter price.

Groceries—We have no chance to notice in prices moderate activity has prevailed in the market for the past week without any transaction worthy of particular remark. The stock generally is ample with the exception of Domestic Liquors and Molasses, which are scarce and advancing in price.

Nov. 8. Cotton—There has been a decline in this article since our last, particularly on the lower qualities. The accounts from Liverpool, per steamer Hibernia, arrived at Boston on the 28th inst., represent that market as a little heavy, with a tendency to decline. These accounts are up to the 19th of last month. The stock in that port was then about 880,000 bales against 730 at the same period last season; the stock of American was estimated at 630,000 bales, or 91,000 bales more than it then was. This state of the stocks of Cotton after an American crop of but little more than two millions of bales, and after a season of uninterrupted good trade in the manufacturing districts is discouraging and checks all tendency to speculation. We now quote inferior in this market at 3 1/2 a 3 3/4, and the best will not bring more than 5 1/2. principal sales are made at 4 1/4, a 5 1/4.

COLUMBIA, Nov. 7. Cotton—Received during the week 3,600 bales—3,522 by wagons, and 78 by Boats, of which 2,232 were sold, and 1,368 stored.—Prices still droop, and there has been a decline of 1/4 of a cent on the higher descriptions, to 1/4 on the middling and lower ones. We quote the current rates as follows: Inferior and ordinary 3 1/4 a 4; Middling 4 1/4 a 4 1/2; Middling fair 4 3/4 a 5; Good fair 5 1/4 a 5 1/2; Good fine 5 1/2 a 5 3/4. Principal sales at 4 1/4 a 5 1/4. Forwarded to Charleston during the week, by Rail-road 4,663 bales, and by Boat 200.
