Curious Verdict .-- A fellow who was frozen to death in Iowa, last winter when the thermonieter was two degrees below zero, was brought before a jury of inquest. They handed a verdict of "death by freez ing," and the thermometer was found guilty of "murder in the second degree."

Re-ult of Temperance .- At the recent assizes held at Kensington, Canada, Mr. Justice Hegerman, in addressing the jury, remarked that- He was happy to say that, in his various circuits through the province, he found crime sensibly in the decrease, and that he was confirmed in his opinion by his brother judges .- That inimperance, the fruitful parent of vice, was of much more rare occurrence in the rural districts than formerly. That these happy results he ascribed to the general increase of wealth and prosperity in the country, and to the more ample means afforded of attending Divine worship .- His lordship observed that one great duty of magistrates was to see that no more than necessary number of tayern licences should be granted.
