HAMBURG, April 26.
Cotton.—On Wednesday there was more eagerness among buyers, and a disposition to go into the market, even at advancing rates from those of the day previous. Thursday opened with a decided improvement in prices, owing to the fact, that the market is below, as also that of New York, on account of the unfavorable news by the steamer; our market assumed a more lively appearance—a still better feeling took hold of buyers, and sellers were enabled to realize full 1/2c. on Tuesday's prices; leaving the market only 1/2c. below our highest quotations for the past four weeks. The market closes dull, with the expectation of later dates from Liverpool. Extremes 5 1/2 a 6 1/2.—Daily Journal.

CHARLESTON, April 26.
Cotton.—The Upland market on Saturday last, that being the first day of our commercial week, passed very quiet, the sales amounting to but 757 bales, without change in prices from the previous week. On Sunday Liverpool dates were received by the Great Western to the 23rd ult. These accounts being considered as much more unfavorable than they have ever been anticipated, the market on Monday came nearly to a dead stand. We quote: Inferior to Ordinary, 5 a 5 1/2; Middling, a middling fair, 5 1/2 a 6; Fair a good fair, 6 1/2 a 6 1/2; Choice, 6 1/2 a 6 3/4.

OBITUARY.
Departed this life on the 2nd April, in the 84th year of her age, Mrs. SARAH BUSH, consort of the late Isaac Bush, both of this District. She was born in North Carolina, but moved in early life with her parents to the State of Georgia. She had a very distinct recollection of "those times that tried men's souls," and was a sharer of those troubles and privations. From Georgia she moved to Greenville District, in this State, and from there to Edgefield. She in early life evinced her devotion to the cause of her great redeemer, which as pre-eminently marked the whole course of her long and checkered life, and enabled her so successfully to withstand its temptations and trials, when religion was at so low an ebb. She was baptized in her 10th year by the Rev. Abraham Marshall, in the State of Georgia, near Briar Creek, and from that until the time of her death 67 years, was a pious and orderly member of the Baptist Church. Her last membership was at Dry Creek Church, and we believe was the oldest member. She was always calm and retiring in her habits, possessing that peace of mind that "surpasses all understanding"—was never known to have a difficulty with a neighbor or friend, or to speak evil of any one. In her latter days her constant theme was religion. For two or three years preceding her death, she met with a heavy affliction in not being able to read the Scripture in not partial failure of sight. She had always been a constant and diligent reader of the word of God, searching after "eternal life." She bore it with the patience and resignation of a true Christian, always repeating the "will of the Lord be done." She was taken sick on Thursday night when returning to rest, and lived only 26 hours, when her ransomed spirit was loosed from its clayey tenement, and took its flight to the haven of bliss—to the "rest that remaineth for the people of God."

HEAD QUARTERS, 2ND BRIGADE,
Honeywood, 10th Feb. 1834.
IN PURSUANCE of an Act of the Legislature, passed on the 19th of December last, entitled "An Act to provide for the Military organization of this State," Commissioners were by me appointed to divide each of the Battalions, composing the 7th and 10th Regiments of the Militia of this State into four Beats, as nearly equal in territory and population as the convenience of the several parts would admit, and to designate in each of the Beats so laid off a suitable and convenient rendezvous or Company Muster Ground. The said Commissioners have made the following reports, viz:

For the Upper Battalion, 7th Regiment.
EDGEFIELD, February 3, 1834.

Sir:—In pursuance of your orders, dated Willington, 1st January, 1834, we have divided the Upper Battalion of the Seventh Regiment of Infantry into four beat companies, and have designated the places of company rendezvous as follows:—
Beat No. 1.—Begin at the old cow-trail, near John Gomillion's, and follow that trail to the head of Bridge Creek; thence down the Creek to the southern line of this District; thence along said line to the road from Edgefield to Charleston; thence up that road to the fork with the New Market road; thence along the New Market road to the Old Wells; thence along the road to Columbia, by the Pine House, to the beginning company rendezvous at Bridwell's, (or Williams's old place.)
Beat No. 2.—Begin at the cow trail near John Gomillion's, and run along the upper Columbia road to Watson's; thence down the Charleston road to the southern line of the District; thence along that line to Bridge Creek; thence up the creek to the old cow-trail, near the head of the Creek; thence up the old cow-trail to the beginning company rendezvous at Posey's, (or Evan's old place.)
Beat No. 3.—Begin at the Pine House, and run along the upper Columbia road to Lot's; thence along the Longcane road to the line between the seventh and ninth Regiments; thence along the regimental line to the road at Lot's; thence down the road following its old track to the west of Pottersville, and including Edgefield Village; thence along the main street to the old Charleston road, opposite to Mitchell's; thence down the Charleston road to the beginning company rendezvous at A. Bland's.
Beat No. 4.—Begin at the Old Wells; thence along the upper Columbia road to its mouth opposite Mitchell's; thence the main street to the Court House in Edgefield; thence up the Blocker road to the regimental line near Lot's; thence along the regimental line, and down Cedar Creek, and down Horn's Creek to the New Market road; thence along the New Market road to the beginning, company rendezvous at William Mays's.
