

Mexico and Texas.—The Mobile Advertiser, of the 20th ult., contains the following important intelligence about the overtures made from Texas to Mexico.

Pensacola, May 20th, 1845.
C. C. Langdon, Esqr.
Dear Sir—The U. S. brig Somers arrived on Monday evening last from Vera Cruz, having despatches for our government.

The Somers brings intelligence that a resolution has passed the House of Representatives of the Mexican Congress, by a vote of 41 to 43, offering to acknowledge the independence of Texas on condition that the latter government will reject the terms of annexation proposed by the U. S. The Somers left Vera Cruz on the 10th, when intelligence was momentarily expected of its passage in the Mexican Senate, where it was understood it would be carried unanimously. This is authentic, received from Capt. Gerry, of the Somers. In haste, your friend, &c.

Mr. Polk and a Second Term.—Not long since some of the papers speculated as to the probable candidacy of President Polk, for a second term. The Washington Union has put this matter at rest. That paper says:

"The President has already declared more than once, that he himself will not be a candidate for a second term of office. He has authorized us to declare it again in the prospectus which we have submitted to the nation as the creed of our own faith and the guide of our own course. He goes in for one term only, to serve his country to the best of his ability, and anxious to testify his gratitude to the people who have honored him by their confidence by devoting himself to their service and not to his continuance in office. He does not, therefore, design to shape his Administration to assist any aspirant, or to make his appointments to promote his own re-election, but to carry out faithfully the powers which the people have placed in his hands.

The Columbus Enquirer of the 21st ult., contains an account of the death of Dr. Potter, late a proprietor and editor of that paper.

Methodist Episcopal Convention.—The Baltimore American of May 14th, says: "In the Southern Methodist Episcopal Convention at Louisville, on Saturday, the resolution from the Committee for a separate organization under the title of the 'Methodist Episcopal Church South,' was adopted by a vote of 94 to 3. The second resolution reported by the committee was adopted unanimously. It is as follows—

Resolved, That while we cannot abandon or compromise the principles of action, upon which we proceeded to a separate organization in the South, nevertheless, cherishing a sincere desire to maintain Christian union and fraternal intercourse with the church North, we shall always be ready, kindly and respectfully to entertain and duly and carefully consider any proposition or plan having for its object the union of the two great bodies in North and South, whether such proposed union be jurisdictional or connectional.

The Convention has not located the Book Concern, as was stated a few days ago, but have left it to the first meeting of the General Conference, which is to be held at Petersburg, Virginia, in May next.

The Missionary society has been located in Louisville.

DREAFUL CATASTROPHE AT YARMOUTH.

From one hundred to one hundred and fifty lives lost.—The London Sun of the evening of May 3d contains a letter from Norwich, written the previous evening, from which the following is an extract: "The most awful excitement pervades this city. A most dreadful accident has occurred at Yarmouth. Mr. Nelson, the clown, belonging to Mr. Cook's circus, now at Yarmouth, announced the performance of being drawn by four geese in the North River. The suspension bridge across this river, and about 518 people were on the bridge, when between five and six o'clock, the bridge fell in. It is reported that 100 to 150 persons perished. The utmost consternation exists here; special trains have started; the telegraph is beset by hundreds anxious to obtain news of relations and friends. The report is, that already fifty three persons have been picked out dead. It is thought many more are still in the river.

Since the above was in type we have received the London Sunday Times of May 4th. The latest accounts from Yarmouth is dated "Friday night," and reports "the number of lives lost to be forty."

The Yarmouth Friday morning papers speak of the bridge as being in a very dangerous state, yet so great a number of persons were allowed to go on it the same day.—Courier.

American Citizens as Consuls.—The Union announces that the President has determined, in all appointments to Consularship, to nominate American citizens, where it is possible.—Patriot.

Minister to England.—The Hon. C. J. Ingersoll, it is said, says the Baltimore Clipper, has been offered the Mission to England.—Patriot.

Died.—Suddenly, of congestive fever, in Barnesville, Montgomery county, Maryland, Mr. Isaac Bell, of the State of New York, aged about 35 years. Delirium rendered him unable to tell the address of his relatives. He had said his mother's maiden name was Poole, and that he had not been at home for years. The British Government, it seems, is directing its attention and its action to the defence of Canada. The Kingston Whig states that Mr. Tucker, the Admiralty builder, arrived by the last steamer on a tour of rapid military inspection. He visited Kingston, and left immediately for Toronto and Niagara. The Whig adds to this announcement the following: "It is said that he will pass rapidly along both shores of Lakes Erie and Ontario, and return to England with all convenient speed. While all present ideas of laying down the keels of the iron steam frigates at Kingston Dock Yard must be abandoned, we cannot help feeling that the prompt attention of the Board of Admiralty to the defenceless state of Canada, and thus sending out their Builder, to inspect the actual condition of things on both sides proves that abandoning the Canadas to the aggressions of our Yankee neighbors, is the last thing to be apprehended."—Patriot.

To the Physicians of Edgefield District.

GENTLEMEN:—Believing that the honor and dignity of our profession may be seriously affected, and is even already, unduly injured, particularly in the country, by a want of that uniformity of conduct among the members of the profession, which is so essential to its maintenance; and feeling it to be the duty of the members of the profession to remove as far as possible any cause which have a tendency to detract from the respectability, honor and dignity of that profession, we feel ourselves sustained in calling the attention of the Physicians of Edgefield District, at least to the consideration of a subject which must be looked upon as one of the great causes in producing the effects above alluded to—the want of a regular fee bill, a uniform system of charges, by which all shall be governed.

We therefore, call on the practicing Physicians of Edgefield District, to meet at Edgefield Court House, on the first Monday in July next, at 2 o'clock, P. M., on that day to assemble together in some suitable room, and adopt such a bill of charges as the times and circumstances require.

After which, the meeting might take into consideration other subjects, and one which will be well worthy of its consideration is, the propriety of establishing a Medical Society or Societies in Edgefield District. The utility of which, if properly conducted, both as regards advancing the science of Medicine and the benefits to the community, must be acknowledged by all.

We flatter ourselves that the importance of the subjects will be sufficient to induce every member of the profession in our District to take a deep interest in the meeting, and to attend, prepared for the transaction of the business above mentioned.
