The deceased was a native of Edgefield Dis-

trict, and resided here until he emigrated t Florida in the fall of 1843. The writer of this humble tribute to his memory became acquain ted with him in 1812 at the school of William Wash Esq., who was then, principal of the Academy; and with the exception of about three years which intervened between that period and 1816, the acquaintance and intimacy, then formed have been continued till he left the State.

The deceased, and Dr. M. Laborde of Co lumbia, Erasmus J. Youngblood Esq., and the writer, formed a class for several months in the years 1816 and 1817, at the Edgefield Acad emy, then under the charge of its most worthy Principal, R. L. Armstrong. Three of the four above named were in College together, though not in the same class; and the deceased graduated in the fall of 1821, in the class of the Rev'd. Dr. Manly now President of the University of Alabama. He studied law in the office of his uncle, the late Col. Eldred Simkins Sen'r., and was admitted to practice but owing to a want of taste for the profession he abandoned it in a year or two, and betool himself to books. Previous to his emigration he had selected a library of rare and valuable standard works, and indulged himself in that sort of intellectual repose which those only know who are fond of reading, and constantly acquiring fresh stores of knowledge. His was a mind peculiarly fitted for such passive exercise, its most remarkable trait being that of memory. Possesing vigor enough to com-prehend and enjoy the beauties of literature, it was not of that practical turn, which insure success in the scramble of every day life.

In his intercourse with the world, he was voked to aiger, no man ever possessed a more indomitable courage, or a more unflinching resolution In all those lofty sentiment which characterize a gentleman of the firs order, he stood pre eminently distinguished and in the cause of a friend who might cal upon him, or in vindication of his own unsul lied honor, he was never known to falter.

In all the social relations of husband, father master, friend-he was kind indulgent, cour teous, and in his dealings with men, that beautiful sentiment of the poet was most strongly impressed upon his mind, and illustra-ted in his life—"An honest man's the noblest work of God."
