La Presse, however, which you may recollect I men tioned some time ago, had declared aagainst the pretentions of America to the Oregon territory, now says that he has no doubt that if the American Government be firm a will obtain every concession it may choose to demand from England: for, adds the Presse, England, so haughty to Europe, invariably cedes every thing to America that America insists upon

the latest arrivals from China confirm . the satisfactory intelligence previously received, that the Emperor of China has revoked the edicts against Christianity. -Fo the French embassador is due the honor of naving induced the great brother of the sun and moon, first courin to all the stars, and uncle to the Green Dragon, to mitigate his severit, to the Christian faith. and his paternal edicts which directed that the missionaries thereof should be chopped into mincemeat. Letters lately received from Freuchmen, in China, represent that he government has fallen into nation for its ill success in the war with England-so much so, that its authority is so enfeebled that it can with difficulty make itself obeyed. From the sources indicated above we learn that President Herrera has been reluctantly compelled to accept the resignation of his late Ministers, viz. L. G. Cuevas, State Department; Mariano Ri va Palacio, Justice; Luis de la Rosa, Treasury; and Garcia Coude, War De partment. This intelligence the President communicated to the Chambers on the 11th August, with expressions of the highest regard for the talents, integrity and patriotism of the Ministry. No definite cause for the resignation and its reluctaut acceptance is assigned, unless it be an allusion to "existing difficulties." In the meantime, till he can organize an entirely new ministry, he has appointed a provisional one, consisting of Jose Maria Daran and Juan Luis Velasquez de Leon, for the port folios of Justice and War, while the duties of both the State and Treasury Departments devolve upon Jose Maria Monasterio. From the Observer. Aug. 9. We learn by recent letters from the Interior, that some disturbances have occurred in Yucatan and in Bacaltar, and that fears are entertained of serious difficulty before the excitement is allayed. Incendearism has shown itself in different parts of the country, and a considerable desstruction of property had already occur-

Late papers which we have received make no mention of these circumstances, but when we recollect that the editor and printer is responsible for every article published without permission of governneut, this is not to be wondered at. The object of the government being to suppress all such information.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 3. Through the polite attention of a commercial house of this city we have received the Diario del Gobierno (the Government paper) of the 11th olt. It contains the official announcement of the election of General Herrera as President of the Republic of Mexico. There are twenty five departments in Mexico, of which the successful candidate must receive the votes of thirteen -being an absolute majority of the whole. It appears that although full returns had not been received, it was ascortained that Herrera had already obtained the suffrages of thirteen departments, and was consequently duly elected President. He will take the oath of office and be inaugurated on the 26th September.

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Consultation of the

The resignation of the various Ministers, of which we made mention yesterday, was purely the consequence of an understanding with the President ad interim when they accepted office under him on the 6th December last. The Diario del Gobierao publishes Cuevas' letter of resignation, in which that functionary refers to the agreement alluded to, and and declares that he and his confreres of the cabinet are only acting in conformity to the terms stipulated at the period of the organization of the new Government.

The only reference made to Texas in this communication is the following: 'You are are about to commence a new administration, with the certainty that the Republic is anixous for internal tranquility, loves and respects the constitutional anthorities, and is resolved to make every sacrifice required by the war which it is necessary to undertake, in consequence of the iniquitous usurpation of the department of Texas."-Bee.

A gentleman arrived here from Washington, states that recent advices from Vera Cruz mention that the churches in that place have been dismantled, and that the inhabitants have sent their valuables into the interior, mostly to Mexico. Many of the roofs of the houses have been sanded to the depth of two or three feet, to save them from the effects of a bombardment of the city by the Americans, which was confidently expected. The steamers Montezuma and Gaudaloupe had been sent up the river and securely anchored, to prevent their capture."

Our informant states that the U. S ship of the line Pennsylvania, which had been lying at the naval anchorage, with a portion of her armament and crew on board, had been taken into the dock, and laid up, as being too large for any service at pres-ent required of her.—Courier, Sih inst.

Ashville, N. C., Aug. 22. Numbers of wagous pass through this lace daily on their way from South Carolina to Tennessee to procure corn, as he crop of that article in a large portion of South Carolina is entirely destroyed. An idea may be had of the destitution of the people when it is known that these wagons are sent from a hundred and fifty to two hundred miles for corn!
