

Missionary Anniversary.—The annual meeting of the American Board commences its public exercises, of three days continuance, in Brooklyn, this day, 9th inst. The Hon. T. Prellinghuysen is expected to deliver the opening discourse. The Society has received the past year upwards of \$255,000. It has now 94 Missionary stations in the four quarters of the globe, and sustains 135 ordained Missionaries and 220 Assistants from this country; making in connection with native Teachers and Assistants supported by the Board, 494, with their numerous schools, churches and printing establishments. The anniversary of this Society, at Worcester, last year, was attended by about 1000 Clergymen and others from a distance, who enjoyed the generous hospitalities of Christian families of all denominations.—*Courier.*

Develop the Moral Powers.—All our moral powers exist in us. The highest aim of our teachers should be to disengage and call them forth, but this is what they think the least of. Without troubling themselves as to whether the house be already full; they only busy themselves about furnishing it. Is there on earth a vice which will not fall before the revelation of the beautiful? An error which will not vanish before the light of reason? and is not conscience more powerful than the sword, the fagot, the torture or pleasure? Develop in Cæsar the moral sentiments which animated Cato, and Rome will be free, and Cæsar will be great. Develop in Alexander the sentiment of the beautiful which animated Socrates; give to his ambition the infinity of virtue, and instead of conquering the world Alexander would render it happy. A generous thought in the soul of the mother was then only required to save the human race.

Georgia State Rail Road.—The Chief Engineer of the State Road, says that freight will be received from the Depot at Marietta, Ga., by the 15th September; for Cartersville by the 15th October, and for a point opposite Cassville, in a few days thereafter. The Georgia Rail Road (says the Augusta Chronicle & Sentinel of Monday last) will be ready for the transportation of passengers and freight from Augusta to Atlanta, its westward terminus, on Monday next, 15th ult. Distance 172 miles; fare \$7,000.—*Han. Journal.*

Stabbing.—A case of this kind occurred in this city on Wednesday last. A man by the name of Stewart, (a journeyman boot-maker), who had been keeping up illicit intercourse with a woman of the name of Edwards, made an assault on the husband of the woman, in the street, and cut a pretty severe gash in the fleshy part of his arm. Edwards had gone to the residence of his wife for the purpose of getting away his child—which so enraged the woman, as it is said, that she furnished her paramour, Stewart, with the weapon, and instigated the attack. We understand that Stewart crossed over to Alabama, but was brought back, and after an examination before Justices Jones and McKenzie, he was bound over to the next Superior Court in \$500—and Mrs. Edwards in \$250. Failing to give security, both were committed to jail.—*Mus. Democrat.*
