HAMBURG, October 9. Cotton.—Since our notice of the market this day week no material change has taken place in prices. The receipts have been moderate and the principal part sold from waggon as it came in at prices ranging from 54 to 74.—Tuesday evenings mail put us in possession of Liverpool dates by the Cambria to the 19th ult. what the effect of these accounts will be on our market has not been fully developed, as very little cotton change hands yesterday, that they will have a favorable tendency, we think there is no doubt. Provisions.—Corn has a downward tendency and will not readily command over 62 to 65. Corn meal is in demand at 70 to 75. Flour is plenty at \$6 to 6.50.

OBITUARY.

Died, at his residence, Poverty Hill, at one o'clock Monday morning the 6th inst., CAPT. EDWARD J. MILLER, in the 27th year of his age; he has left a wife and child and a large circle of relatives and friends to mourn their loss. Poor Ned, as I loved best to call him; I knew him well, and if an honest heart, a kind and generous disposition be any recommendation, thy claims are paramount to a kind reception, and that borne from no transient feelings.

Another Revolutionary Hero.

Died at his residence, on Horse Creek, near this place, on Thursday, the 25th September last, Mr. JACOB WISE, a soldier of the revolution, aged 92 years. Mr. Wise volunteered his services in defence of his country at an early period of the Revolutionary War. He participated in the battle of Stono, and distinguished himself in several of the many skirmishes which took place in this State between the Whigs and Tories. His house was for a long time the rendezvous of the Whigs in this part of the State. His hospitality, humanity and hospitality were the leading traits in the character of Mr. Wise; and it has been the frequent subject of remark amongst his neighbors, that he never had an enemy throughout his long and eventful life. He was born on Pee Dee River, in this State, but emigrated with his father to his late residence in this District when but seven years of age.

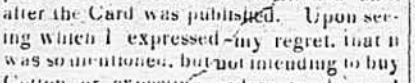

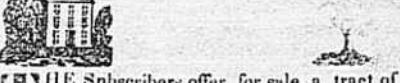
