

THE TARIFF AND THE ADMINISTRATION.

The *Richmond Enquirer*, the other day did us the honor to say it had looked with some curiosity at our comments on the position of the Administration, as now revealed on the Tariff. The *Enquirer* had left us no room for curiosity as to its comments. It had pledged itself to approve and praise, too deeply to allow a doubt that the approval and praise would be spontaneous, vehement and indiscriminating. For our part, we had hoped before this to gratify the curiosity of the *Enquirer*, and of all enquiring friends; but such has been the flood of matter pouring upon us, that not till now could we find room for the Report of Mr. Walker, of which we desired to receive as the foundation of our avowal, that in regard to its Financial Policy we are to be counted among the approvers and supporters of the Administration—that we are ready to follow its lead and fight under its standard, on the principles of Mr. Walker's Report. To the President's Message we took exception, because we thought its language liable to an interpretation leading to conclusions we could not approve. We take the Secretary's Report as the authoritative interpretation of the Message, and so taking it, we cheerfully and heartily avow our adherence to the Administration on the Tariff question. Never since the foundation of the Government, has subject of the purposes and limits of the taxing power, received from the Executive such able and comprehensive examination.

The argument of Mr. Walker is clear powerful, and penetrates all the recesses of the question, showing that he has no fear to look in the face all the fair results of his principles—and with all these principles we cordially agree. On some minor points, we are at liberty to dissent. As a principle, the Secretary is right that taxation on luxuries is more just than on necessities—but we doubt whether as a general rule, it is more productive, or whether the former do not feel the tax more sensibly than the latter. Part of the difference of conclusion may be obtained by the statement of a very simple fact—so generally overlooked—that the consumption of luxuries is not confined to the rich—that the poor have an equal appetite for them, and do actually consume more in proportion to their means, than the rich. The poor man, it is true, can only entertain his friends at long intervals;—but double the price of all the little luxuries proper for such an occasion, and perhaps he will be unable to do it at all. The poor man's wife and daughters can only indulge sparingly in personal ornament,—lay a heavy tax on all luxuries of apparel, and they may be wholly deprived of this little. Doubtless a great enhancement of the price of laces and jewelry is felt by every chambermaid in the land. Cheapen luxuries, and we are persuaded the poor will do more than their share in increasing the consumption. In legislating on silks and satins, it would be a great mistake to suppose we are interfering only with the indulgences of the rich.—*Charleston Mercury.*

Secession Threatened in Ohio.—In the House of Representatives of the United States on Monday, Mr. Gibbins presented, among others, a remonstrance from citizens of Ashland, Ohio, against the admission into the Union of Texas as a slave State, and in case of her being so admitted the petitioners regard the act such an outrage upon the constitution, and the rights of the free States, that they call for the removal of the same, and the rights of the free States for the formation of a distinct confederacy, excluding the slave States.

Mr. G. moved the reference of the said petition to a committee, to be composed of one member from each State of the Union. Mr. Graham moved to lay the petition on the table.—*Char. Evening News.*

Great Pigeon Roost.—The *Miami's Express*, published at Danapur, notices a wonderful pigeon roost in the forks of the Maquoketa, Jackson county, (Wis.) It is three miles long and half a mile in width. There can be no estimate made of their numbers. Their roosting places are about a mile distant from their nests and feeding places, being three in number, and each one covering a section of land; and, in passing to and from they darken the air with their numbers, break down young trees with their weight, and hundreds are killed by getting entangled in the falling limbs and branches. The people kill them with clubs, and their noise is so loud that when a gun is fired amongst them, the report cannot be heard, and a person can stand in one place and shoot all day, the birds returning as soon as they can load.

Large yield of Corn.—The Highland Messenger says:—We are informed by Mr. Alexander Porter, the manager on the farm of Thos. T. Patton, Esq., that an acre of corn was planted on the farm the last season, with which it was designed to contend for the prize, offered by the *Burcombe Agricultural Society*, and that a few days since the corn was gathered and measured, and the yield was one hundred and thirteen bushels and a half. His farm is on Swanana river. Here, farmers, is an evidence of what can be done. Had the season been good, Mr. Porter has no doubt the yield would have been one hundred and fifty bushels!
