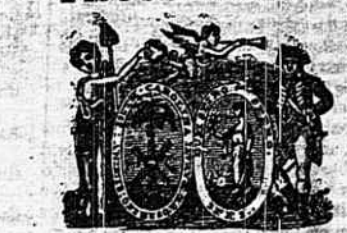

Sommers, Esq., of St. Paul's Parish, by some person or persons, supposed to be runaway slaves, and as it has been reported that a second attempt was made, (on the night of the 11th June, in Sumterville, where the aforesaid Kit was removed for safety and attendance, on account of his wounds,) by shooting through the window into his room, at the dwelling: Now, know ye, that justice may be done, I do hereby offer a reward of ONE HUNDRED DOLLARS for the apprehension and safe delivery, at any jail within this State, of the perpetrators of the above act.
