Friendly feelings and salutations have a directly constrary effect. Friends, if this be not all true, take what is, act upon it, I entreat

Be friendly to your fellow beings. Especially let this be the case, until they have proved themselves unworthy of your respect and confidence. Even in a selfish point of view, you will loose nothing .-But you will gain the friendship and love of your fellows. Do you consider the friendship, love, respect and approbation of the rest of mankind valueless? Poor soul! then you are to be pitied! I have frequently been pained to see

people so very cold in their salutations.-They will perhaps affect to have their attention on some other object, and give one or two fingers instead of the whole hand. And even some, who make considerable pretensions to "good breeding," present the left hand instead of the right, and with a careless look some other way .-This is saying, by an act, to the person they salute, "I am better than thou !"-It is in lact, an insult; and you had better neversalute another than to present the left hand. (Do not say this is an "old wife's fable.") But why do people act thus? Is it because "the left hand is nearest to their hearts," as they sometimes say? TRIAL FOR MURDER. The trial of Richard, slave of Robert

Rowand, charged with the murder of Maria, also the slave of Mr. R. wand, took place at the City Hall yesterday, at 11 A. M. The Court consisted of :-

We forbear, on the recommendation of the Court of Magistrates and Freeholders, to publish the evidence in this case, as there is a trial pending before the Court of General Sessions against Mrs, Eliza Rowand, the mistress, on the same charge, and much of the testimony before the Magistrates Court being inadmissible in a Court of higher jurisdiction, we think it incorrect to prejudice the public mind.

The unanimous charge of the Court to the Freeholders upon the evidence, was that they were to consider and make up their minds from the facts detailed by the witnesses, whether or not the prisoner was guilty of having struck the blows which ved fatal, as if they were not satisfied dey were inflicted by him, but by

Mes. Rowand, he must be acquited. The Court also charged the Freeholders according and unequivocally upon the law, wherever a slave in the presence and command of his owner committed an unlawfor act as murder or other crime, that he was the were instrment of his owners creeks, and having no will of his own, could not be amenable to the punishment of the law. In all such cases the owner was to be regarded as the guilty party, and upon him the vindicatory part of the law must fall. In this case, if they, from the evidence came to the conclusion that Richard bad even inflicted the fatal blow, being under the control and order of Mrs. Rowand, and that the testimony made out the killing to be murderous, the owner was guilty of murder, and the slave must be acquited.

The Freeholeers, under the charge of the Court, merely retired a sufficient time to write the verdict "Nor Guilty," which was concurred in by the presiding Magistrates, and Richard was discharged. Eve News.
