MONTHLY CALENDAR OF HORTICULTURE, &c.
FOR SEPTEMBER.

Turnips.—The principal crop of turnips should be sown in this month, and as the weather is somewhat cooler and moister, there is a greater chance of succeeding than in August.

Ruta Baga.—If none were sown last month, or they have failed for any cause, they ought not to be delayed any longer. Those which were sown on seed beds, or when they were too thick, should now be transplanted out where they are to remain.

We have in the August number given directions for the sowing and management of this vegetable.

Cabbages.—This is the proper month for sowing cabbage seed, for to head in the spring. It is perfectly useless however, to sow any for that purpose, now, unless you can procure European seed. All plants from American seed, will, instead of heading in the spring, run to seed, and you will have only a crop of sprouts, instead of fine heads, which you may have calculated on.

With genuine European seed, this misfortune will not befall you; they will nearly every one head, not one perhaps in a hundred will run to seed from this sowing, and you will enjoy them in the spring, when your less fortunate or less careful neighbors are obliged to be content with sprouts only. Continue to transplant out cabbage plants they will make fine heads during the winter.

Spinage.—You may venture to sow a larger quantity of spinage in this month; they are however, still liable to the attacks of worms.

Cauliflower and Broccoli.—If you have plants, do not delay to transplant them out now; they will not flower before spring, but if they escape the cold weather, they will form fine heads, if properly managed. We refer to the previous numbers for directions.

Carrots, Salsify and Beets.—There is more prospect of succeeding with these vegetables in this month than the last.

Lettuce.—Transplant out your lettuce plants from those sown last month, as they occupy but small space. You may plant them along the borders of your beds, but should you prefer to have them by themselves, you must make up your beds 4 feet wide. Make it very rich, and set your plants in rows 12 inches from each other in the row. The large varieties will require more space than this. Sow more seeds, as from this sowing your principal supply for the winter must be derived.

Endive.—This vegetable is very little cultivated in this neighborhood but some persons are very fond of it. It may be sown now and as soon as large enough, transplanted out, setting the plants 12 inches each way.

Onions and Leeks.—Sow seeds of onions and leeks now, and as soon as large enough, transplant them out where they are to remain.

Celery.—Continue to earth up your celery, always performing the operation in dry weather, and taking care that none of the earth falls into and among the leaves, which would cause them to rot.

Radishes.—Both winter and summer varieties of radishes may be sown this month, the latter every fortnight.

The Genus Laefer.—There are several species of this class of the animal kingdom, in these parts, which are well worthy of the study of Naturalists. Had we the ability of a Buffon or a Cuvier, and ample time to boot, we might give a description that would immortalize us, but these being wanting, we shall only give a brief sketch, or our 'first impressions' of two or three varieties of the creature, which have come under our notice.

First, we have the gentleman laefer—a biped of most dainty aspect and genteel appearance. He wears the finest broadcloth and cassimere—has his costume prepared at the fashionable emporiums—smokes the Havana—drinks Oltard's best—sports the most brilliant jewelry and drives the fastest trotting horses in the country. He is considerable of a politician, too—talks largely of the measures of Government and party, and once a year takes a fashionable visit to Saratoga or the Warm Springs. He is likewise quite a ladies man, and is ever foremost in getting up gay parties of pleasure, &c. But you never see any of this class pay an honest debt to a tradesman on the bill of his washer woman. When he wants an article of dry goods or clothing, he puts on a bold front, steps into the store where such articles are kept, and suiting himself, to a fraction, he has a parcel wrapped up and handed to him, with a parcel with a most gracious bow and patronizing air, he departs, saying please put me down for the bill, on your books, or 'I will hand you the money for this in a few days,' and that is the last the merchant sees either of his goods or his money!

Secondly, we have the Jack-leg mechanic laefer. This species is distinguished by a sort of self-conceit or swell-headedness which aspires to the position of 'boss' before the individual so affected has half learned the trade or calling which he follows. His manifestations are downright laziness, coupled with a grumbling disposition on account of the greater success of others, in the same line of business together with a feeling of nasty pride which prevents the possessor from working at all, unless he can get full wages for his imperfect labor. The consequence is that he is often without employment, and 'loafs' around from shop to shop to the great annoyance of those who are industrious and energetic.

Thirdly, we have the Buchananian or ragged laefer, who sleeps on the side-walks or on a stall at the market house, or in a vacant cellar. He worships at the shrine of Bacchus and doats on rot-gut whiskey. It is 'meat, drink washing and lodging' to him to get along side the wharf when the barrels of Monongahela are being landed from the steamer, and he can get a suck at the contents, via an oaten straw, through a gimlet hole. When not otherwise engaged, you will find this species elevated to the position of Cerberus, at such places as Port Price. He is a bully in his way, and carries a big club or a long knife wherewith to make his way through the world, and oft times into a Penitentiary, or to still more elevated place on the gallows! In short, he is 'some,' in the slang of the day.

There are also one or two other distinct species of the genus laefer, but we have not time now to enlarge upon the topic, but shall dismiss the same with the remark that no one need put on this shoe unless it fits him, to a nicety.—Muscooge Democrat.
