On Wednesday morning, the news of the arrival of the Acadia with advices from Liverpool to the 4m inst. came to hand but as they were very indefinite and unsatisfactory, it left it difficult for buyers to know how to act; and, notwithstanding they did operate with great caution, still the prices of the previous day were fully sustained, and in some instances a shade higher rates were paid. In the evening, another despatch was received, reporting a brisk market in Liverpool at an advance of 1-8J, on American Cotton. These accounts caused our market to open brisk on Thursday, and as the day ad vanced, prices stiffened, untill, the class of business, it was found that 5 5 16 was the current price for fair Cotton, and, in some instances, even higher rates had been paid.
