We would therefore respectfully recommend that a new site be purchased, and a new Jail be built of suitable dimensions and of proper strength. We do further recommend that the Legislature of this State do take into consideration the propriety of adopting the Penitentiary system and of passing a law in favor of building a Penitentiary.

We further would respectfully recommend that a suitable appropriation be made by the Legislature for the purpose of cleaning out the obstructions in the Savannah River, from Bull-stone to Hamburg.
