"LEARN TO SWIM WITHOUT CORKS." Senator Butler, in his Edgefield speech, stated a fact, which appears to have created surprise-that a Southern Newspaper can scarcely be found in a reading room in

Washington city. The editor of that ex-cellent paper, the North Carolina Argus, in commenting upon this subject, speaks with great truthfulness as follows: Southern papers themselves are much to blame for this state of things. Have they not in fact set the example which the

reading rooms in Washington have followed? Who could learn from our Southern prints generally, that papers are actually published anywhere except on the Northern side of Mason and Dickson's Line? Do they not fill their columns with the premium prospectuses, and drain their ink-horns in writing lauditory paragraphs on the contents of those very papers, instead of exerting their talents to build up the press of their own section of country ? It seems to us that this is so; and we have often deprecated the practice."

The Argus is right. When we see in papers in South Cafolina columns occupied with the prospectuses of Northern papers and periodicals, we lament their degeneracy of taste, where there are just as good publications scattered all around them at home. A large portion of the immense value of Northern news establishments has been created by Southern patronage; when we have yet to learn of the first publisher South of Mason and Dixon's line who has made a fortune at the business. The Argus winds up with the following sound advice:

"We must depend more upon ourselves at the south-not only in respect to newspapers, but in respect to every thing else. Learn to swim without corks,' was the first sentence that arrested our attention in Jacob's Reader, when we commenced the study of Latin ; and it has been present to our mind ever since. Let the South do this. Let it dispense with the corks, gourds and wooden nutmegs of the North, and depend more upon its own energies, and it will ride upon the waves more like 'a thing of life' than it has ever done. This is the sort of 'non-intercourse' that we inculcate. We want to see our enterprise simulated, our own industry encouraged, our own mechanics rewarded, and then the cry of injustice, of oppression, of abolition, of disunion, will no longer poison the gale or stun the public ear. We desire not to be cut off from the North; but we desire to equal it, and even surpass it, in the race of improvement; and this we can only do "by swimming with corks!"-South Curolinian.

THE OVERFLOW .- The water, we are sorry to say, is still gaining ground, notwithstanding the vigorous efforts that are being made to construct outlets for it through the Metairie Bridge. Apart from the melancholy reflections caused by the disastrous state of affairs, many parts of the inundated districts present gay scenes. In the rear of the upper part of the Second Municipality the appearance is that of a regular lake, and all sorts of water craft are to be seen. Sailing parties are becoming quite the rage, and boats have in this vicinity entirely superseded carrs and carriages. The Shell Road is covered for a considerable distance; in fact, the largest portion of it this side of the Half-Way House, to a navigable depth, and gentlemen can either ride or sail down. The fare at the toll-gate on boats has not yet been regulated, but we expect to see it posted up all rights in a few days.

Nearly the whole space back of Rampart st., between the New Canal and the Canal Carondelet, is also overflowed, and persons fond of piscatory sports can, in many parts of this district, set in their own doors and catch fish.

We strolled down yesterday afternoon along the Canal Carondelet, and were much amused and interested in contemplating the scene. The levee on the north side of the canal is the boundary of the overflow, preventing the lower part of the First Municipality from being inundated From Derhigny-street on the other side, (south.) one vast sheet of water is persented to the view. and all the streets being covered, and some of them to the depth of one or two feet. The roads on the north side of the canal presented to the eye of the distant spectator the appearance of a moving panorama. Vehicles of every description were to be seen, besides throngs of equestrians, and the bank of the canal was crowded with ladies and gentleman drawn thither by curiosity to witness the scene of inundation.

How long this state of affairs will last. it is impossible at the present to say, but we trust that the efforts being made will at least check the progress of the flood .-N. O. Picayune, May 18th.

UNFORTUNATE AFFAIR .- From a priwate letter received in this city yesterday by a highly respectable gentlemat, we learn the particulars of a most melancholy occurence, such as we have not heard of for many a day in Pennsylvania. From the letter it appears that a man of the name of Patrick Malone, together with his wife, and child, left a place called Kersey, in Elk county. Pa., on Saturday last, with a horse and some fixings, having to pass through a dense wilderness to reach a place called Hickory, in Clearfield county. The body of the man was found the next day a little from the road side with the arms folded across the breast, and the wife's cloak with some other of her wearing apparel, carefully laid over him. On the day, following, the body of the wife was found dead and her little child two years old nearly dead, four miles from the place where was discovered the remains of the deceased husband and father. The poor woman had died with the child in ber arms. It would seem from appearances that she had remained with her husband until after his death. The horse had travelled on to the first clearing, where his appearance, saddled and bridled, and without an owner, excited attention, and led to the discovery. The wife is a niece of a res- D. L. NORTHERN DREAD OF SOUTHERN COM-PETITION .- The fears indicated in the following comments of the New-York Dry Goods Reporter, (a journal devoted to and supported by Northern Merchants and Manufacturers,) shows the impression pronuced at the North by the industrial efforts of the South.

The paper uses the following language: "We are gratified to witness the improvements that are constantly making in manufacturing at the North, but are fully persuaded that in order to avail themselves of the present suspicious time, it is necessary that many, very many reductions should be made in their establishments, and the number of spindles increased. The South is making rapid headway in manusacturing, and, according to present ap-pearances, it will not be a long time before another large market will be cut off from the Eastern manufacturer. Already are goods offered for sale in our market which were made in States that ten years since had scarcely a spinning wheel, much less a power loom factory within their borders."

He then, after quoting the testimony of the Telegraph as to the fitness of Slave labor for Factories, and the success of that experiment, goes on to say :

'Here, then is to be a class of operatives situated in the middle of the cotton field. in competition with whom the Northern laborer will stand a sorry chance, while the giant resources of the West are thundering in our ears, each telling us in language too plain to be misunderstood, that some means must be devised by which the cost of production at the North may be lessened.'

Here, then, is an admission of the effects to be produced by persevering in the path so well opened, and 'so energetically pur-sued of late.—Columbia Telegraph.

EXPORTATION OF DOMESTICS .- The new Graniteville Manufacturing Company shipped on board the barque Carolian—which vessel sailed from this port on Tuesday last, for New-York-one hundred and seventy-six packages of shirtings and sheetings, made at their Factory. We are pleased to see a portion of our staple sent abroad in a manufactured state, instead of the raw material being shipped, as for-merly, to the North, to be returned to us in cloth, with all the expenses of freight, commissions, insurance, drayage, and the many other charges that accumulate, as all who have the handling of it in such case must of course have their compensa-

tion for doing the business.

A few years more, and the enterprize of the South will develope her ability to manufacture and supply others instead of depending on them for supplies. Men of capital—and there is no actual want of it among our citizens-willsoon find manufacturing to be a profitable investment, the raw material being at their very doors, and interest will induce them to engage in the business .- Charleston Courier.


