THE S. CAROLINA COLLEGE.

The Temperance Advocate, of Thursday, furnishes us with a record of some of the proceedings of the Board of Trustees at their late meeting.

The President, Hon. W. C. Preston, has been in feeble health for some time past, and the Board have requested him to take leave of absence until the first of October next, with an expression of hope in which every citizen of South Carolina will unite, that he will soon be restored to health and usefulness.

The Board have appropriated \$2000 to convey water into all the College buildings, and \$4000 to take down and reconstruct the centre building of the Old North College. Both appropriations were needful, and will add much to the comfort and convenience of professors and students.

The Trustees have amended their restrictive laws, so as to exclude intoxicating drinks of all kinds from the College buildings. Spirituous liquors were prohibited before.

The Board now regulate the expenditure of the tuition fund. They require the Executive Committee, the Literary Committee, the Faculty, and the Treasurer, at each meeting of the Board, to report and specify all estimated expenditures which may be needed during the recess of the Board, when that body will make the necessary appropriation. By this regulation, it is thought that, in a few years, the fund may be increased so as to enable the Trustees to erect all necessary new buildings, and possibly provide for Professorships of Law and Agriculture.

The Hon. David Johnson, who had been a Trustee from 1815—until the close of his gubernatorial term—thirty-four years—was unanimously chosen to fill the vacancy in the elective members of the Board, occasioned by the election W. B. Seabrook, esq., Governor of the State. Truly does the Advocate say, "No man in South Carolina better merits honor and distinction than ex-Governor Johnson."

The South Carolina College, under its present management and Boards of Professors, is justly gaining high reputation. Much as she has done to elevate the character of this State, her importance, usefulness, and happy influence are becoming more and more appreciated, and more widely extended and felt. The State will still cherish this institution, and under the guidance and control of its present Faculty and Board of Trustees, we feel well assured of her occupying a high position among the more time-honored institutions of learning through the land.—South Carolinian.

THE BLACKS AT THE NORTH.—We find a paragraph in a Baltimore paper, which too truly indicates wretched condition of a great portion of the blacks in Northern cities. It states that Officers Ray and Teal, whilst engaged yesterday under the direction of the Board of Health, in removing some degraded negroes from a house in McElderry street, found in one of the rooms, the body of a colored woman, who had been dead for four days, and which was in a state of the most horrible putrefaction; the inmates of the house being too indifferently to the offensive spectacle to take the necessary steps to have it buried by the city authorities.
