BALTIMORE, Oct. 21.—A Vessel just arrived at New-Longdon, (Ct.) from Davis' Straits, brings tidings that the Indians report Sir John Franklin as being in Prince Regent's Inlet, having been ice-bound there four years. They represent him and his party as being all well.

SIR.—I have the honor to inform you that on the 18th inst., I had an interview with the Chiefs of the Florida Indians at Charlotte's Harbor. They disclaim for the nation all disposition unfriendly to the whites—say the recent outrages were unknown to the nation—and were perpetrated by a few outlaws, who deserved punishment, and who will be surrendered to our justice sometime in the course of the coming month.

Under these circumstances, I entertain the hope that security and confidence will soon be secured to the citizens.

LOSS BY THE OVERFLOW IN RED RIVER.—The Alexandria (La.) Republican thus estimates the immense damage sustained by the planters in the vicinity of Red River, caused by the overflow.

"In that parish alone, if the crop of cotton be estimated at 25,000 bales, and of sugar at 10,000 hogsheads, with the usual quantity of molasses, the loss will be \$1,700,000; and should the injuries done to the corn crop and property generally be taken into consideration, it will run up to \$3,000,000. The Red River valley, instead of giving 130,000 bales of cotton, will not yield this year more than 30,000. Here is a loss of \$5,000,000.

GUTTA PERCHA SOLUTIONS.—Gutta Percha readily dissolves in a solution of chloroform without the aid of heat. The solution thus formed makes a capital varnish, for if it is brushed on any object, the chloroform evaporates with great rapidity, and leaves a thin skin of the gutta percha, which thus acts as a preservative against the influence of air and water. It is therefore excellent as a plaster or cuts. This solution is excellent to preserve fruit in a collection of natural history. Heretofore wax has been used for this purpose, but it is not so good as this, for this solution prevents the fruit from drying. This solution is the best and most delicate varnish for paintings and drawings on paper.

THRILLING INCIDENT.—Pro. Hitchcock in a letter to the Amherst Express, from Virginia, describing some of the coal mines in that State, relates the following incident:

"A hunter, one autumnal evening eagerly following in the chase, found himself sliding down into an abandoned coal pit; but, seizing upon the top of a bush as he slipped down the crazy side, he hung dangling in the air over the black gulf, and felt conscious, from his knowledge of the place, that if he fell he would drop at least two hundred feet and be dashed to pieces on the rocks beneath. He struggled in vain to regain a foothold. He heard the cry of his fellow hunters and of the hounds as they bounded past. He shouted with all his might, and the forest returned his echo, but no voice of rescue came with it. The winds whistled around him, and the moon shone upon his face, but they brought no relief. His strength rapidly failed; he thought in agony of his family and friends, but he must die an awful death, and even his mangled body never be discovered. His mind became bewildered, his muscles gave out, and down he went—down—down—swifter and swifter, nor struck the bottom till he had reached the enormous depth of—six inches."

MR. CALHOUN'S EXPECTED WORK.—The N. Y. Courier, announces that a work by Mr. Calhoun, "On the elementary principles of Government, and the Constitution of the United States" will be published at an early day by the Messrs. Harper. It had been known perhaps to most of our readers that Mr. Calhoun was engaged on a work of that kind, and it will be looked for with much anxiety and interest. We have heard also that Mr. Webster is preparing for publication a work on Constitutional law.
