What we now propose.

1st. To enlarge our operations, that while continuing to provide for the public, schools of the highest character and controlled by our denomination, we can at the same time render the advantages to be derived from them, accessible to all, even the poorest Baptists in our State. Especially do we wish to provide for the education of the children of poor Baptist preachers, so that they may be educated gratuitously. We have already, by the recent resolutions of our board of Trustees, thrown open our Academies to such children of the above class, as may at time wish to enter. We propose also to admit upon the same terms, orphan children, whose parents were members of our churches.

2d. We also wish to furnish for young gentlemen and ladies, advantages similar to those furnished by Normal Schools at the North and in Europe; where such of our talented youth as desire it, can fit themselves for the profession of teaching; and thus, as far as possible obviate the necessity of being dependent upon the North, for Teachers manufactured expressly for a Southern market.

In order to accomplish these objects, which we believe to be as highly prized by our brethren generally, as by ourselves, we have resolved to lay our plans before them and solicit their co-operation in the following measures:

1st. To secure by contribution the sum of \$15,000, to be invested in buildings, &c., which when added to that already expended, will give us \$25,000 worth of buildings and appurtenances.

2nd. To raise by the same method, an amount sufficient to form a permanent fund, to be held and controlled by the Edgfield Baptist Association, the interest only of which shall be expended in boarding those poor Baptist children, who are receiving in the Institutions, gratuitous instruction.

3rd. To use their influence, that those of our denomination, who are able to pay for the education of their children, may be induced to patronize our schools, if on inquiry, they are found worthy of patronage. We can thus dispense with a fund for the payment of the salaries of our teachers, experience having already satisfied us that where the buildings and appurtenances are furnished, the income of a prosperous school is abundantly sufficient to meet all its expenses.

In order to bring the subject more immediately before you, we have solicited and secured the services of Rev. JAMES M. CHILES, (for several years past the President of our Board of Trustees,) as Agent, whom we refer you for any further explanation respecting our plans.
