THE FIRST SESSION commences September 18th.

The Institute building will contain eight rooms, all of which are appropriated to purposes of instruction.

A fine apparatus; a large collection of Maps; Anatomical Charts, Globes, &c.; a Museum of Natural History; a Cabinet of Minerals and Shells; furnish unusual facilities for acquiring a practical knowledge of the different branches of Science.

Two new Pianos have been purchased in addition to those already in the Institute. The course of Study is of an elevated character, and more comprehensive, than that of most female institutions of the highest reputation.

The PRINCIPAL devotes the whole of his time to the supervision and instruction of the various classes.

The Assistants are experienced in their different Departments, and those only of known success in teaching are employed.

The Academic year is divided into Sessions of 14 weeks each. It is of great importance that the student be present at the commencement of the Session. The Classes are then formed, and a few weeks delay may affect the standing of the pupil throughout the year.

Tuition is charged but from the time of entrance to the end of the session. Payments are to be made at the close of each session.

Unusual facilities are given for a thorough Musical Education.

In addition to other improvements, which are now in progress, a large covered playground, for exercise in wet weather, and a gymnasium, are to be erected.

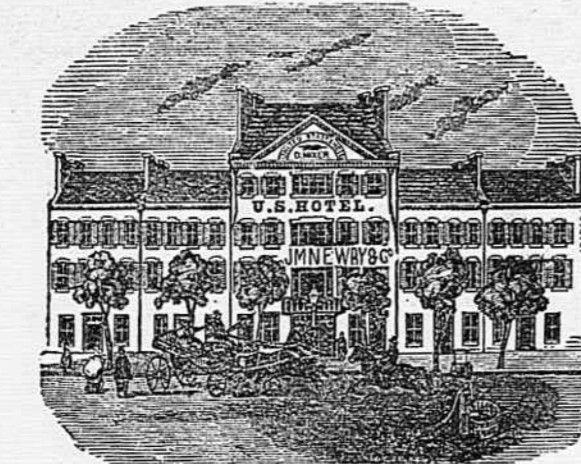
