How to Keep Harness in Order. Observing the good condition and fine appearance of the harness of Ald. Baker, proprietor of the most extensive livery estab-

lishment in Rochester, we requested him to impart to us, for publication, the modus operandi by which so desirable a result was achieved. In compliance therewith, he stated the course adopted as the best and most conomical, after twenty years experience in a business which required considerable attention to tackling apparatus. His process of oiling and washing harness is substantially as follows: Take Neats Foot Oil, and Ivory or Patent

Black-the latter well pulverized, or to be made so before using. Mix thoroughlyadding the black until the oil is well colored or quite black. In cool weather the oil should be warmed somewhat before mixing. With a sponge apply a light coat of the mixtureonly what the leather will readily absorb, unless the harness is very dry, in which case a heavier coating may be necessary. After the harness is dry-which will be in two hours to half or a whole day, depending upon the weather and previous condition of the leather-wash thoroughly with soap suds. In making the suds, use good Castile soap and cold rain water-warm water should never be used on harness leather. Apply the suds with a sponge. Rub off with buckskin. This will give your harness a nice, glossy surface, and the leather will retain a good color and continue pliable for months. If it becomes soiled with n.ud, or sweat, an application of soap and water, as above directed, (without oiling.) will be sufficient to give

it a bright appearance. Two applications of this oil and black mixture a year, (or once every six months) will be sufficient to keep harness, as ordinarily used, in good order. It may be neces-Bary for livery men, and others who use harness constantly, to apply the oil oftenerbut in most cases two oilings a year, and washing with suds when soiled, will keep a set of harness in good trim for sight and service. This process will pay a large dividend in extra service and durability-to say nothing of improved appearance.

Onion Culture at the South.

There is scarcely a vegetable that enters into so many compositions of cookery as the onion. It is considered one of the healthiest of vegetables, and should abound in every garden at the South the year round. for whether served up whole at the table or chopped and used to flavor soups, stews, hashes, &c., it is a wholesome and nourishing vegetable and should be had by every house-wife of the South for culture. The difficulty of keeping the onion after maturity in this climate, has been a great draw back to its culture. Wethersfield furnishes twothirds of all the onions consumed at the South. But we have cultivated our onions, like many other veretables and fruits, without adapting them to our own peculiar cli- Youths' and Children's Clothing,

There are two ways of propagating the onion, one from the blackseed, and the other from the top or button. The soil for onions must be rich, and should abound in potash, as that is one of its special manures. Guano applied in the fall and well turned under, is one of the best manures, and hen manure is almost equal to it. Ashes may be sowed broad cast over the plants during their growth. Premising that the soil is rich, deep and mellow, plant the black seed in September, October, January, February and March. The fall planted ones will mature CARRIAGES, BUGGIES, &c. earliest; plant in drills about eighteen inearliest; plant in drilds about eighteen inches apart, and thin out to six inches in the drill. The top, or button of the large bulb that profuces them, should be planted early in the full. The button will produce a fine onion in the spring the large bulb, a cluster of onions at the root, and a bunch of but-make immediate settlement, and those having detons at the top. This bulb should be planted as soon as matured. The two varieties law. of onions, the seed and button, will give the ca e'al and judicious cultivator a constant | Oct 26

supply of this almost indispensable vegetable any month in the year. The fall planted button maturing early in the spring, the fall planted seed early in the summer the spring planted seed early in the fall; and the early fall planted, large batton bulbs, being fit for table all the winter. Thus giving a constant succession of onions for the table, from one year's end to another. And yet many country people, planters, eat Wethersfield onions three months in the year, and go without the balance.--Soil of the South.

Gypsum for Gardening Purposes. This valuable fertilizer is not yet half appreciated by Southern gardeners. As a manure for poor soils, it is valueless; its chief benefits arises from its power of holding and fixing the ammonia which rises from manure already in the soil, and we look upon anything as manure that is food for plants, whether it comes from the stable or the swamp. From the sulphur in Gypsum, it is a great preventive of worms; gardens well dressed with it, will be exempt from the cut worm. Young cabbages and turnips sprinkled with Gypsum in their germing state will be exempt from the ravages of the green worm. Guano is doubly increased in value by being sowed with plaster. The past dry summer has fully developed the utility of Gypsum; wherever we applied Gypsum to the onions, English peas, Irieh potatoes, or melons, there we have had the finest crops, notwithstanding the drought. We observe when there has been no dew at night, and all vegetation looks parched and dry, where
Gypsum has been fully used in the garden,
there is a dampne-s in the morning like a
dew had fallen. It is asserted by an eminent Northern Horticulturist, that Gypsum Lump Magnesia, Strychnine, is positively injurious to strawberries: we Mum's Elixir of Opium, Fahnestock's Vermifuge, is positively injurious to strawberries; we have no doubt but it stimulates the vine into too rapid a growth, and as we of the South want fruit instead of vine, it should be used cautiously. But for garden vegetables, where those vegetables have anything to feed upon, Gypsum is a great promoter of appetite by moistening the food ready for the rootlets to take up with their thousand mouths. It can be had in the New York market at about \$1 per barrel.-Exchange paper.

HINTS TO FARMERS .-- Whoever will apply an ointment made of gunpowder, brimstone and common grease, behind the neck of their lambs, will be sure to have them protected from all kinds of vermin. The quantity necessary to be made use of is so small that a sixpenny worth is sufficient to dress upwards of two hundred lambs.

The better animals can be fed, and the more comfortable they can be kept, the more profitable they are, and all farmers work for profit. What ought to be done to-day, do it if you can; for to-morrow it may rain.
