

By an Act of Congress, approved February 3, 1853, all widows of Revolu ionary officers and soldiers are entitled to "Pension for Life," of the same amount their husbands drew or would have drawn, had they applied.

Heretofore none were entitled only married previous to January, 1800.

"Five years additional Pension" is granted under the above Acts to widows and orphans who der the above Acts to widows and orpinals who have been pensioned under Acts of July 21, 1848, and Feb. 22, 1849. And all widows and orphans (under sixteen) are now entitled to five years' pension, where their husbands or fathers died in service in the war of 1812, or in any war since 1790, or

who died after discharge, of wounds received or discase contracted in said service.

Every officer and soldier who has (at any time) been wounded, or in any way disabled, while in the service or the United States and in the line of his duty, is entitled to pension for life, according to the degree of disability.

Bounty Lanes-Every officer and soldier who
