Just here we are brought to a halt by the reflection that, although all men may agree to the correctness of the above remarks, still the great bone of contention is when to sow, and whether the time of sowing has any thing to do in removing the two greatest obstacles in the production of wheat-the Hessian fly and late frosts.

In looking over the Patent Office Reports on agriculture for 1852-3, we were struck with the remarkable coincidence of opinion, that late sowing was the surest preventive of the Hessian fly. But two contra opinions were offered, one for early sowing, and the other early sowing after cotton. The clean culture of cotton doubtless has much to do with the exemption of cotton land from the fly. In grassy and weedy lands they most do congregate, increase and multiply. It is evident that there must be some good reason for this agreement among farmers over the whole Union, that late sowing is the safest course-what is it? In a climate like ours, it may be presumed that an insect which is hatched out in from four to fifteen days, can propagate its species to an alarming extent during September, October and November. As we rarely have a freeze hard enough to kill the eggs or drive off these pests before December, all wheat coming up during the warm days of September, October and November, certainly stands a fair chance to be well stocked with the Hessian, which is in full feather during that period. Thorough preparation of the soil, good manuring and late sowing, (after freezes,) would seem to be the safest course. At all events, you stand a chance to escape the fall brood, and if your wheat is well advanced in the spring | Boot and Shoe Manufactory. hatching cannot do you much damage.-There is no chance to dodge his vernal visits.

Then what must be done to meet this difficulty? We know but one remedy: close pasturage with small stock—sheep, calves and colts. We do not mean downright grazing one's wheat into the earth, but keeping just stock enough on it (in dry weather only.) as will keep it nicely clipped over until the 1st March.

It has been argued by some that early sowing, with close pasturage, would save the crop from the fly and frost both, but it has not been our experience.

But there is another drawback we had almost forgotton, simply, we suppose, hecause we had found a remedy-rust. This can easily be avoided by sowing early varieties of wheat. " Late wheat will not do." seems to be a common opinion, and early wheat can be kept back out of frost's way by proper grazing-there is no doubt of that. We know fields that were grazed till 1st March, that now bid fair to average ten bushels per acre, while others in sight which had much the better wheat before the frost. will not average five, under the most favorable circumstances. It is not an isolated case.
