Being not permanently settled, she had never moved her membership from the Pleasant Grove Baptist church, in this District, for several years. But, she is gone, and it is our duty to submit without a murmur, to the will of Him, in whose hands are issues of life and death.

There is no sadder record than that of the death of a young man in the prime of a long life of happiness. To see such an one's manly and vigorous form sink by disease into the grave, remains too fresh to be forgotten, and it is a source of great grief. This child of man of fine intellect, of great generosity, and of the most amiable disposition of mind, had secured the attachment of a greater number of friends, than probably any of his age in our community. He was an affable, courteous, kind, and most faithful friend.

The tribute of tears and of sympathy for his heart-stricken wife, parents, brothers and relatives, is mingled with a mournful realization by all of his friends, of no common grief and regret that one so young, so kind and so full of promise, should have been so early bereft of his life. It was the hand of God that has lifted him to the skies, a blessed company of Angels has received his spirit home, and a house not made with hands, eternal in the heavens, has been prepared for him.

It sometimes occurs that the partiality of a friendly hand identifies the dead and presents a character far brighter than the living deserved. But with Mr. CASTLEMAN this cannot be done, he was more allotted an equal portion, however skillful might be the artist.

He was naturally benevolent and possessed of a quick, quiet, cheerful and affectionate disposition, and these qualities were all exalted and purified by a strong Christian faith. He had no kindred in the world, but he left behind him a wife, a daughter, and a son, who are all his friends, and he has left behind him a name which will be remembered by those who have known him, and who will pray for him, and who will be glad to hear of his welfare, and who will be glad to hear of his success in the world.
