WASHINGTON, July 23, 1856 An important measure, and of great in terest to all classes of people, has just been consummated by the Agricultural Bureau of the Patent Office. Dr. Charles T. Jackson, the well known Chemist, of Boston, has been engaged by the Department to travel through the country and make chemical analysis of various kinds, with a view to determining the amount of natriment in different kinds of grain-the amount of tanning contained in the barks and other materials used by tauners-the determination of the amount of phosphoric acid in the soils on the seaboard, supposed to be exhausted, as compaired with the virgin soil of the West, and other matters connected with soils. The duties of Dr. Jackson will include an analvsis of the cotton ash, with a view of determining the amount of mineral matter extracted from the soil by the plant. It is thought that the cotton of the sea islands owes its soperior quality to the absorption of soda from the saline soil or atmosphere, or from both, and this analysis of the ash is to determine the question as to quality between this description of cotton and that of the interior-whether the preponderance of soda or potash is the cause of the difference. An analysis of the two soils will also be made with a view of establishing the fact, Dr. J. will also experiment to ascertain the best means of deodorsing the sewerage and fætal matter of cities and large towns, and converting them into fertillizers. This commission is one of the most important projections of this active and useful Bureau, and from the well known reputation of the gentleman employed, an interesting, full and satisfactory report may be looked for. The hay crop occupies an important position in the agricultural interest of this country, and it is proposed by the Department, as soon as circumstances will admit, to make investiga tions, chemically, of the various grasses, and the soils best adapted to their cultivation.

RITCHING HORSES.

The most common fault in matching horses is this:—The first thing that is looked after is a match of color. This should be the last requisite. The point of importance. and without which you never can have a matched team, is that they travel alike, and this includes gait, speed, and action. If one is a square trotter, the other must not shuffl . or rack. If one goes high and clear, the other must not have a long swing. If one lets out with long reaches, the other must not mince, else they are not only daily but each damages the others gait without helping his own. The next point is constitution, or vital force and endurance; and with this, must be reckoned age, temper, and intelligence, and whatever goes to make up the moral character of the animals. These points, of course will affect and govern the excellence and unity of the first, but are subordinate in this, that vital force can make amends for the absence of action, and no amiableness of temper can compensate the lack of locomotion, since horses are esteem ed for what they can do, rather than for what they know. The third point is size; and with this must be reckoned style and build. In fact, style runs thro' all the points. but more especially in carriage. Having settled these points, then if the span match is color, so much the better; but do not hitch up an ill-assorted team in every other res pect but color and size, and then think that curles, checks, and woodchuck skin will make them match; he thing can't be done. and the foolish attempt to do it has turned loose upon the world a good many of the broken down plugs which disgrace our horse stock. Many a horse would have per formed tolerably well by himself or with one of his own gait and bottom to the end o. his days, which by a different mating babeen ruined at six or eight years of age, and is good for nothing afterwards. Boys, look to this matter in making up your match of teams.

A NOVELTY IN COTTON BALEING.

Our attention has been recently directed to a new invention for compressing cotton bales, which bids fair, in appearance at least. to supersede the use of rope. Iron bands for cotton bales are not absolutely a novelty : but all which have been used heretofore have been found more or less objectionable. Mr. D. McComb, of Memphis, Tenn., has recently invented what he calls " Iron Tie for cotton bales," which, as far as we are able to judge, either from personal inspection, or from the highly respectable list of certificates which he offers, promises to be completely successful. It is claimed that this tie is easy of application to the bale, can be taken off, shortened and re-used, and furnished at even a less cost than the rope.

- It is easily adapted to all the presses now in use, and reduces the size of the bale, besides rendering it more secure against damage from fire or water. Phe plantation presses generally make a bale of about thirty inches which, after the pressure is removed, expands under the rope tie to about forty-two inches. The press in New Orleans compresses the bale to about twenty three inches. and retains it by means of the iron ties at that size. The strength of the iron band has been successfully tested in New Orleans, by throwing a number of bales thus put up into the hold of a vessel twenty seven feet i depth. Certain responsible parties in Vicks burg were so well satisfied with the invention, that they invested thirty thousand dol lars in a fractional of interest of the patent.

Within four days after the agents in this city, Messrs. Dumesnil, Bell & Co., exhibited a bale put up in this manner, one hundred and eight thousand and fifty-seven ties were sold to planters trading in this market. The invention is now fairly before the public, and it is the duty of the planters to examine into its merits for themselves. Messrs. Dumesnil, Murdock & Co, of New York are agents for the Atlantic States, and furnish the tie, delivered on board of vessels, at eight cents per pound .- Commercial Review.

JUICE OF THE WATER MELON. - A COITES. pondent of the Prairie Farmer presents the following method of using water melons: I endeavor, every year, to raise a good water melon patch. They are a healthy and delightful fruit, I think. I cultivate the icing variety; plant early in May, and again towards the end of the month, so that they may come in succession. When they com mence ripening, we commence cutting, and use them freely during the bot weather. When the weather becomes cool in September, we haul a quantity of them to the house split them open, with a spoon scrape out the pulps in a cullender, and strain the wateinto vessels.

We boil it in an iron vessel, then put is apples or peaches, like making apple butter and boil slowly until the fruit is well cooked. then spice to taste, and you have something that most people will prefer to apple butteor any kind of preserves. Or the syrup may be boiled without fruit, down to molas ses which will be found to be as fine as any sugar house molasses. We have made in fall as much as ten gallons of the apple but ter, if I may so call it; and molasses which has kept in fine condition until May.

A SEASONABLE BEVERAGE.-To make nice summer bear take 14 g illons of water, 14 lbs. of loaf sugar, 4 ounces of ginger well pounded, boil one hour, add the white of 8 eggs heat up, and tare off the scum strain the liquor into eart on pans, let i stand till cold, then put it into your cash with the peal of 14 lemons cut thin, and their juice strained. Add half a spoonful o ale yeast on top. Stop the vessel closely for a fortnight. Then it may be bottled, and in another fortnight it will be fit for use.
