In obedience to the resolutions of the General Assembly, the Commissioner of the New State House invites proposals for FURNISHING AND DRESSING STONES FOR THE BASE, MENTORY OF THE NEW STATE HOUSE, according to the annexed list of stones and specifications of dressing, &c. Bids will be received for THE ROUGH STONE DELIVERED IN THE YARD AND THE DRESSING, either separately or jointly.

The contractor for the rough stone will be required to take the Quarry Tools, Cranes and Machinery already prepared, at a fair and reasonable price, and the contractor for the dressing will be required to pay a like price for the Cranes, Cutting Sleds, Blacksmith Shop and Cutting Tools upon the yard, a schedule of all which, with the estimated value, may be seen and examined in the Architect's office. Approved security will be required for the prompt and faithful performance of the contract. Bidders must make their proposals in writing, stating the names of their sureties, seal, and endorse "Proposals for Furnishing Stone," or "Proposals for Dressing Stone," or "Proposals for Furnishing and Dressing Stone," as the case may be, and leave them at the Commissioner's office, on or before the 31st day of January, instant, on which day the bids will be opened.

Specification of Cut Granite-Work and Masonry Wanted, to Complete the Foundation and Basement of the New State House at Columbia, S. C.

1. **Masonry of Foundation Piers for the Porticos.**
This part of the work consists of the two upper courses of the portico foundations, containing altogether 233 stones, of such dimensions as shown in the annexed list; the stone for it to be sound granite, free of sap and seams, to be worked to the regular dimensions, pin-hammers, on their inside joints, beds and ends, and pointed off square on their outer faces. The beds for this work to be made per perch of 23 cubic feet, for foundation piers of portico.

2. **Finished Granite Work for the Basement.**
The whole of the exterior facing, piers and corners of basement, consists, as per annexed list, of 1,658 stones, arranged in headers and stretchers, and of such finished dimensions as they by shown in said list. Also for the interior, 2 square piers, 32 1/2 inch diameter, of 24 inches diameter at the base, and 24 1/2 inch for the same; all of which must be worked fine and true, as per drawings and details, in the best manner. The exterior facing, or sillar of the basement, must be worked for the windows of the building and the sides of the porticos) with fine cut beveled, or rustic joints, and one inch fine cut margin around the face of each stone; the remainder of the face to be with inclined rustic striping, as per samples on the yard. All the facing under the porticos to be cut fine, with flush joints, to all the windows and doors, as per sample on the yard. The beds, builds and joints to be all kept flat, and to be well hammered clear back; the front edge returns worked back fine, for 3 inches all around, and the end backed off square to the proper dimensions of each stone, all as per sample on the yard.

All the above cut stone-work must be of the best quality of granite, free from all defects, such as iron, veins, seams, sap, &c., and of uniform color, and to conform with the sample exhibited in the office, and labeled "Granby".

The finished work to be stacked, or deposited on the yard, at such places and in such assorted quantities near the building as may be designated by the Architect; and all of the work and material shall be subject to the inspection and approval of the Architect. The decision of the Commissioner to be final.

The bids for the rough granite alone, delivered at the yard, may be separate from the cutting, and should be per cubic foot; the measurement to be taken by the actual sizes of the finished stone ready to be set. The method of measuring finished work will be the following, and the bids should correspond with it, and be given per square foot:

1. Per square foot of face, of strip work, including the face of the beveled rustic joints and fine cut margin around.
2. Per square foot of beds, builds and joints, worked as above specified, 2 inches fine on the edge, and the rest pin-hammered.
3. Per square foot of fine cut face-work.
4. Per square foot of backing off.
5. Per square foot of cornice, as per drawing, measuring cut and length.
6. Per piece of Doric column, shafts, caps and bases, finished as per drawing.

For all these measurements, the general size of the finished stone, with their given dimensions, will be used.

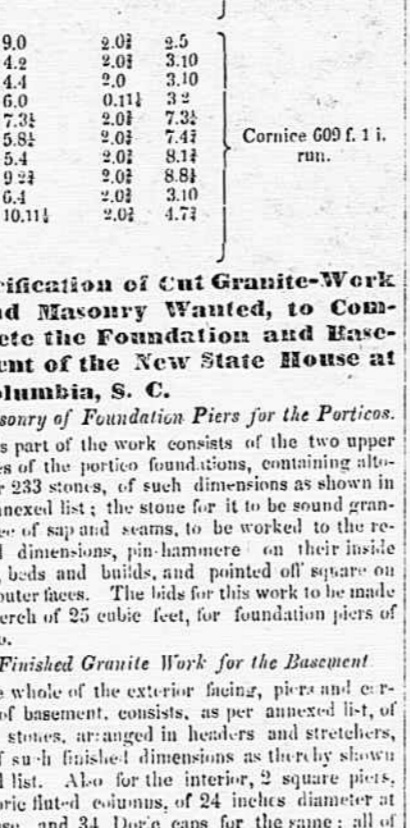
