## NEW STATE HOUSE.

Office of Commissioner of New State House, COLUMBIA, January 8, 1857.

IN obidence to the resolutions of the General Assembly, the Commissioners of the New State House invite proposals for FURNISHING AND DRESSING THE STONE FOR THE BASEMENT STORY OF THE NEW STATE HOUSE, according to the annexed plan, and specifications of freedom.

The bids will be received for THE ROUGH STONE DELIVERED IN THE YARD, and THE DRESSING, either separately or jointly. The contractor for the rough stone will be required to take the Quarry Tools, Cranes and Machinery already prepared, at a fair and reasonable price, and the contractor for the dressing will be required to pay a like price for the Cranes, Cutting Shears, Blacksmith Shop and Cutting Tools upon the yard, a schedule of all which, with the estimated value may be seen and examined in the Architect's office. Approved security will be required for the prompt and faithful performance of the contract. Bidders must make their proposals in writing, stating the names of their sureties, seal, endorse them "Proposals for Furnishing Stone," or "Proposals for Dressing Stone," or "Proposals for Furnishing and Dressing Stone at Columbia, S. C."

1. *Masonry of Foundation Piers for the Porticos.*

This part of the work consists of the two upper courses of the portico foundations, containing altogether 233 stones, of such dimensions as shown in the annexed list; the stone for it to be sound granite, free of sap and seams, to be worked to the required dimensions, pin-hammered on their inside joints, beds and heads, and pointed off square on their outer faces. The bids for this work to be made per cubic foot of 25 cubic feet, for foundation piers of 10 ft. square.

2. *Finished Granite Work for the Basement.*

The whole of the exterior facing, piers and cornices of basements, consists, as per annexed list, of 1,658 stones, arranged in headers and stretchers, and of such finished dimensions as are shown in said list. Also for the interior, 2 square piers, 32 Doric flat columns, 24 inches diameter at the base, and 34 Doric caps for the same; all of which must be worked fine and true, as per drawing and details, in the best manner. The exterior facing, or aslar of the basement, must be worked for the wings of the porticos with fine cut bedded, or rustic joints, and one inch cut margin around the face of each stone; the remainder of the face to be well indented rustic striping as per drawing on the yard.

All the facing stones are to be cut fine, with flush joints, in the best manner, as well as the reveals, or returns, to all the windows and doors, as per sample in the yard. The beds, heads and joints to be all kept full, and to be well hammered back clear; the front edge returns worked back fine, for 3 inches all around, and the backd off square to the proper dimensions of each stone, all at per sample on the yard.

All the aforesaid cut stone must be of the best quality of granite, free from all defects, such as iron, veins, seams, sap, &c., and of uniform color, and to conform with the sample exhibited in the office, and labeled "Granby."

The finished work to be stacked, or deposited on the yard, at such places and in such assortments near the building as may be designated by the Architect; and all of the work and material shall be subject to the inspection and approval of the Architect. The decision of the Commissioners to final.

The bids for the rough granite alone, delivered at the yard, may be separate, but the measurement to be taken, and the gross size of the finished stone ready to be set. The method of measuring finished work will be the following, and the bids should correspond with it, and be given per square foot:

1. Per square foot of face, of strip d work, inclusive of the beveld rustic joints and fine cut draft around.

2. Per square foot of beds, builds and joints, worked as before specified, 3 inches fine on the edge, and the rest pin-hammered.

3. Per square foot of fine cut face-work.

4. Per square foot of bucking off.

5. Per square foot of cornice, as per drawing, measuring girt and length.

6. Per piece of Doric column, shafts, caps and bases, finished as per drawing.

For all these measurements, the actual size of the finished stone, with their grain dimensions, will be taken.
