From the Harrisburg (Pa) Argus. THE DEATH PENALTY.

At no period, perhaps, says the Highstown (N. J.) Exectsion, has the subject of Capital Punishment occupied so much of the attention of the citizens of our State as within the past few months. The public mind has been and still remains deeply interested in it, and presen indications are that it will be thoroughly exam ined, and a decision rendered in every mind either for or against it. It is an old time-honored statute, sustained by all nations through all ages down to the present, and thus being familiarized with it we are the less apt to question its consis tency. Of late years, however, the popular feeling has risen against it, and in some sections it has been blotted from the statute books. In all Christian communities it receives but little sympathy, being held, as it really is, as a relic of Judaism. The true Christian-who received Christ as his guide-cannot support or respect the human law that demands the cold-blooder nurder of a fellow-being. Very distinctly does Paul speak on this subject in his epistle to the

The idea which formerly existed that Capital Punishment was necessary as an example to evil designed persons has long since practically exploded. Public executions are now held in private, within the prison walls, where the gaze of the curious may not witness the exhibition. And why, if the example is a good one and one calculated to strike terror to the heart of each looker on? Why not erect the gibbet in the middle of the most public thoroughfare and there let the terrible example speak its warning to every passer by? Because it is too wel known that all such scenes only familiarize and harden the heart of the beholder. In a moral view it has almost ceased to be argued that capital panishment is benificial, and in many instan ces our judges pass the sentence of death as they themselves say "to maintain the dignity of the law." Therefore, if the community is not benefited by capital punishment, there is but one other party to be benefited, if we except the majesty of the law, and that is the crimial.

All panishment is supposed to be inflicted for the benefit and reformation of the punished, and if it has not this object in view it ceases to be punishment and becomes cruelty, barbarity. In the case of capital punishment it becomes merely a legal, a judicial murder—a murder in cold blood and with malice aforethought, while it claim merey on the ground of passion which at

Very few murders are committed otherwise has lost her sway. Were it not so there might be more hope for the beacticial effects of exam-The primary crime being committed, we hold, gives no right for the commission of auother. If the man is clearly proved a murderer, take away his liberties and opportunities for the commission of another crime, and punish and reform, but do not usurp the right of the Al-mighty in taking that which no human power age. can restore. Hanging the murderer cannot bring back his victim, and is no better protection of society, while its moral influence we con-

sider is very peraleious. Under existing laws it is very difficult, and in many places almost impossible, to convict a murderer where the penalty is death. The reason is obvious, and were the penalty imprisonment for life, justice would be done the offenders in nearly every case. There is a natural horror in every breast against being the judicial murderer of a fellow creature, and if possible the sentence will be avoided. This subject is one worthy the attention of legislators for the public good, and should be acted upon. Society demands that a change should be made in our criminal laws, and any movement toward abolishing capital punishment we believe would meet with a hearty co-operation from the public.

MANNERS.

There is but one true, invulnerable aristocraev. and that has its foundation in good manners and sound morals, coupled with intelligence. Indeed. where manners and morals are right, the intelligence is never wanting. The best conditions of birth and wealth are fortuitous—depending for their continuance upon chance; but good manners and sound morals can be swept away by no accident or misfortune, being self-sustaining and imperishable. Abundant and almost percetual instances prove that the best and noblest of men may spring from the lowest temporal ranks, and that riches, and titles and honors, may be actually MORNING, at 11 o'clock, and controlled the quired by men of obscurest origin. What is it, then, that can and may properly distinguish men is our regard, and lift one above another on the principles of aristocracy? Why, simply this superiority in manners and morals. Just so far as men excel in this direction, they are better and nobler than their fellows. They are an aristocracy-refusing, in the very nature of things, to mix or assimilate with inferior conditions-just as oil refuses to mix with water. The very highest enlightenment is marked by these signs, and while no ill-mannered, had-moraled person can be a gentleman, the real foremost gentleman in all the world is he whose manners and morals are best. 
