Confederate States -- Recognition of

ther Independence &c. Mr. Entron:-If there ever was a period in the history of States, when invasive war might be considered a public benefit, the present times afford an opportunity of testing the correctness of the assumption. The Southern portion of the Inte federal Union had for years complained of the injustice of the North, but its wailings would invariably sink into gentle normors, as the hand of the dominant party extended some little favour, in the nature of an "obolus to Belis trius," Aroused at length, bowever, by the power of a bitterly hostile party at the North, exhibited in the election of Mr. Lincoln to the Presidency, the Southera people resolved themselves into their constituent elements and constructed a new Government under the name and style of the "Confederate States of America." The disruption of the late Union, to every philosophical mind was an act dependent on time alone for its consummation. The formation of a Federal union, by the thirteen colonies was a measure of prudence called for by the necessity of the times, and the weakness of the colonies. It was not in the contemplation of the framers of the Government to bind posterity to a personnent Union. In fact they could not have done so, even if they had so desired. The diversified soil, and climate of North America. forbide the idea of an homogeneous people, and, consequently, a compact which in all time to come would be the chart of Government to which al alike would render obedience. The continued injustice of the North, and the late election of Mr. Lincoln, only hastened the crisis which was the inevitable consequence of the repugnancies of the two sections, and produced an era from which tile elemental principles of the North and South are to be exhibited and developed. Henceforth two Governments must exist in North America, thi of the South, and that of the North; but under what peculiar form, is yet beyond the reach of mortal prescience.

These persons are merely creations and creatures of the Constitution and the laws of the late United States. Their duties are plainly field down and defined, and beyond the strict letter of the law they are powerless. The Constitution of the United States does not prohibit secession. The acts of Congress do not prohibit it. It is only denied by Mr. Lincoln, his Cabinet, and tien. Scott, and prohibited by them. It will be remarked that in regard to the political rights of the several States of the late Union, there is me tribunal that can decide thereon. The Suprem-Court, which is the highest under that Government, and controlling the judicial power of the Union, together with other inferior Courts, car exacelse jurisdiction only of cases in Law and Equity arising under the Constitution, laws of the United States, and treaties. But if we examine the ninth and teath articles, of the amendments to the Constitution, we sill perceive that "the enumeration in the Constitution of certain rights. shall not be construed to deny or disparage others retained by the people," and " that the power, not delegated to the United States, by the Constitution, nor prohibited by it to the States, are reserved to the States respectively, or to the people." It will be perceived, that the only powers possessed by the Government of the United States are those which are commerated in the Constitution, the instrument creating and cetablishing it; and the Edugateld District, at the next election. powers possessed by the States are all those which are not delegated. The powers of these two Governments then, the General and State, are very onsily ascertainable. As all powers, not delegated to the United States, are by the express terms of the Constitution reserved to the States, it follows necessarily that the Federal Government, cannot take cognizance of, or exercise jurisdiction over any questions not included among the delegated powers, and within the enumeration of those expressly mentioned in the Constitution. Where any difficulty arises, or should arise as to the powers of the Government, the Courts are the only Constitutional sources, from whence buthoritalive decisions thereupon shall emanate; and these tribun Is have jurisdict on only of cases in Low and Equity arising an Jee the Constitution and laws. It will therefore appear very evident, that is regard to the reserved powers, the States individually. must be the only judges, and that any attempt or the part of the Federal Government to assumjurisdiction over the reserved powers of States is an exercise of authority unwarranted by the Federal Constitution and clearly a destruction of the original Federal Union per se, by usurpation.
