

STATE OF SOUTH CAROLINA. ) Executive Department, July 6, 1861. A CCORDING to An Act of the Confederate Congress, entitled "An Act to put into operation the Government under the permanent constitution of the Confederate States of America," it is required that each State shall vote on the first Wednesday in November next, for President and Vice President of the Confederate States, which officers are to be inaugurated on the twenty-

second of Vebruary next, and WBEREAS the existing law of the State pro President shall be appointed by the Legislature, and whereas, the Legislature of this State will not be in regular session at the time prescribed by the aforesaid Act, for appointment of Electors, Therefore, be it known that I, F. W. PICK-ENS, Governor in and over the State of South Caroline, by virtue of the power vested in me by the Constitution, authorizing the Governor, on extraordinary occasions, to convene the General Assombly, do issue this, my PROCLAMATION, calling upon and requesting the Senators and the members of the House of Representatives to con-veue in Columbia on the first Monday in November next ensuing, that they may be present in the Henrof Representatives on the said first Wedges-day in November, to appeint Electors of Presi-dent and Vice President of the Confederate States
