HEADQUARTERS, July 15, 1861. By the Governor of South Carolina. A PROCLAMATION. .

WHEREAS, THE PRESIDENT OF THE CONFEDERATE STATES OF AMERI-CA has made a requisition upon the State of South Carolina for three thousand men, that being the quota of the State in the additional force now the Volunteers offering for this service shall be received "for and during the continuance of the war;" and whereas, it is right and proper that such requisition should be promptly complied with. Therefore, I, F. W. PICKENS, Governor and Commander in Chief in and over the State of South Carolina, by virtue of authority vested in me by law, do hereby proclaim that Volunteers for this service are desired, and will be accepted, in companies, "for and during the continuance of the war," to the number of three thousand men: cach company to be composed of one Captain, one First Lieutenant, two Second Lieuten-ants, four Sergeonts, four Corporals, two musi-cians, and not less than sixty-four, nor more than one hundred privates; the officers to be elected by the companies respectively. No men will be re-ceived, except those of proper age and health.
