In camp, on the march, and under the fire of the enemy, all of our men acted nobly; remembering the prestige which our State has ever maintained, and determined that her fair fame should never be turnished by act of theirs.

It is then unjust to pass any over in silence and particularization amounts almost to the excluof the unnoticed ones from the praise due to all. Content with the approbation of the Generals, as evinced by their published reports, my pen should never have been used in behalf of my friends in the 7th Regiment, if it had not been for an extract in your paper, from the " Greenville Patriot and Mountaineer," relative to the share which General McGowan contributed to the glorious victory of the 21st July; attributing to him the salvation of

Without attempting to detract, in the slightest degree, from the merit of Gen. McGowan, we must confess, that the writer of the above-mentioned article pays a very poor compliment to the vigilance and ability of our commander, who would scarcely have neglected proper precautions the battle, Company E., commanded by Captain DENNY, was posted about a mile from Mitchell's Ford, in a grove of oaks on the left of the road leading to Centreville-being in full view of the enemy's pickets, who were stationed upon the opposite side of the old field, which lay between the two. The Yankee forces appeared to be resting after the repulse they had suffered on the preceding Thursday, and rallying all their energies for a desperate attack upon some portion of our line. About 2 P. M. Capt. D. observed a dense cloud of dust in the direction of our left wing, inducing the belief that the enemy's forces were proceding in that direction, and reported the fact to the officer of the day, Lieut. Col. FOSTER. At 5 P. M., Company E. was relieved by Company F. Capt. HARD; when the Yankee pickets were still plainly visible, evidently very much emboldened by the support of a superior force, and the known supe-

riority in range of their guns. The night passed without any particular incident other than an unusual commotion in the enemy's camp, evinced by veciferous cheering, the beating of drums, and the stirring strains of national melodies, which were once so sweet to Southern ears. About 2 A. M., on Sunday morning, the appearance of a Drummond light immediately over Centreville clearly indicated that the enemy were about to advance, to engage us in deadly conflict. The fact was at once reported to Gen. Bonnan; and soon after, a dull heavy rumbling broke upon the sacred stillness of the cool air of the Sabbath morning. The noise was believed by Capt. H., and his officers, to be the relling of artillery carriages in the direction of our right wing, and accordingly reported to the General. On the reception of the information, Gen. McGowan and the officer of the day rode out to the posts of the advanced pickets; but, for some minutes, were unable to determine the nature of the noise. At length doubt yielded to conviction, and they returned to repeat Capt. HARD's report: ing on those directions, and was accompanied by fantry were plainly visible, confirming the reports which had been made to the Generals, and promising a bloody engagement.

It will be seen that the acts below are intended

o regulate our State elections; but the Con tion of the Confederate States gives Congress the nower, if they think proper, to establish a uniform day in the States for holding the elections of members of Congress, and the act of Congress, fixing the first Wednesday in October next, says that the election is to be conducted according to the forms established by each State. F. W. PICKENS.

An extract from an act to after and amend the tenth section of the first article of the Constitution of the State of South Carolina. "Senators and members of the House of Representatives shall be chosen on the TUESDAY AFTER THE SECOND MONDAY IN OCTO-BER, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight bundred and sixty-two, and on the same day every second year thereafter, in such manner and at such times as are herein directed," &c.

Extract from an act to alter and amend the law in relation to the method of counting votes in all elections by the people,
"That hereafter, in all elections by the people,
the managers shall proceed to count the votes publiely, immediately after the final closing of the polls at the precinct where the votes have been taken, make out a certificate of the result, which shall be signed by the managers, or a majority of them, and taken to the Court House, or place now fixed by law for counting the votes, on the day next subsequent to the day of the said election, on or before the hour of four o'clock, P. M., by ne or more of the said managers," &c. Sept. 11 1861,
