I send you a sample of what the old burg of Edgefield has done in the Potato way this year, 1861. The largest I send weighed when first dug, 6 lbs., clean washed-that was a week since. At this time it may fall a little short of that; but the sockdoliger of the patch weighed | patch. 11; lbs. Another weighed 8 lbs. This Mrs. Ju-LIA BUTLER will vouch for.

My little patch contained one-fourth of an acre, haid off into 40 rows three feet apart. I measured from one of these rows 21 bushels of good eating potatoes, besides the small ones I gave to my hogs,-I think a full i bushel more. General: In reply to your inquiries, I have the honor to inform you that in my opinion there has been some misapprehension in regard to the condition and state of feeling of the negrous in the vicinity of Beaufort, and upon Port Royal Island. I visited Beaufort, and rode through the Island, in company with a small escort, yesterday morning We saw no indications of any general disuffection among the negroes.
