HEADQ'ES DEP'T OF S. C., GA., ALB., FLA. CHARLESTON, S. U., Sept. 22 1863. Sir: During the night of the 8th inst. thirty or more of the enemy's launches, containing about 800 men, attacked bort Sumter, defended by the Charleston Bettalion, under Major Blake Major Miliett being in com-mand of the post Preparations had been made for such an event, and at a concerted signal, all the batteries bearing on the work asted by the gun-boat "Chicora," properly assisted by the gun-boat current for fort; located opened on the exterior of the fort; fire-balls and hand grenades were thrown out by the sarrison, which behaved with coolness and gallantry. In less than half an hour, the enemy was decisively repulsed, leaving in our hands 125 prisoners, (thirteen officers included,) five launches and five colors. He addimust have been large. son flag, weather word, stained and tattered, which was reported by some of the prisoners to be the one that had been lowered to us when Fort Sumter was surrendered by the United States on the 13th April, 1861.

The appearance of this flag, and she cir-cumstances under which it was found, satisfy me that really it is the same one that Maj. Anderson was permitted to remove, and which our adversary hoped to replace above the shattered walk of that fortress as a dramatic surcesse to his humiliation. With the sanction of the War Department, I have to present it, through your Excellency, to the State of South Carolina, as the fitting costodian of : flug that was designed to mark and make memorable the disconfiture of your people, in the face of your wives, children and servants. FREDING AN ARMY-YANKEE ENTERPRISE. -To form a proper idea of the difficulty of feeding a large army, it is only necessary to visit one of the Commissariat Depots. Take the single article of bread for the army of the Potomse, and we find its requires a building covering an acre of ground; twenty ovens are in constant operation, two hundred workmen are employed, and five hundred barrels of flour daily converted into ninety thousand loaves, of twenty-two ounces each, of the best quality of bread. The army regulations require that each man shall receive a daily ra tion of twenty-two ounces of bread, or of flur; by baking the savings to the Government in the month of June alone was 3174 barrels of flour, and in four months the difference in the cost of flour and bread has benis enough to pay all the cost of erecting and furnishing the bakery with a surplus of \$7000, while the army has better bread than could have been made in camp. Some idea of the magnitude of its operations may be gathered from the fact that in one day last February 114,550, loaves were issued.—Yankee Paper.
