The Expulsion of British Consuls.

RICHMOND October 11.—The official correspondence with the State Dept. relative to the expulsion of the British Consuls, is published in the Sentinel, this morning, and occupies nearly a page of that paper. The first letter, dated the 21st inst., is addressed by Secretary Benjamin to Mr. Shields, informing him of the course of expulsion of the British consular agents in the Confederacy, in order that he may have the power of correcting any misrepresentation on the subject. Mr. Benjamin then proceeds with a very lengthy review about the course of the British Government and that of the Confederacy, relating to these officials, and refers to communications addressed to the State and Confederate authorities by two out of three British consular agents remaining here, that they had received instructions from their Government to pursue a course in regard to the consuls of British origin resident within the Confederacy, which Mr. Benjamin says is impossible to tolerate. After an explanation of the provisions of the conscription law, and a statement of the concessions made to the consuls at the instance of the British Consuls, Mr. Benjamin alludes to the recent correspondence of Fullerton and Blitch, asserting the existence of instructions from their Government counselling enlisted soldiers to judge for themselves as to their right to exemptions. This unwarrantable assumption by foreign officials of jurisdiction within our territory, and this offensive encroachment on the sovereignty of the Confederate States, has been repeated by the President's order of immediate departure of all British consular agents from our country. The next letter is from Mr. Benjamin to Fullerton, briefly recapitulating the evidence of his assumption of jurisdiction, ordering him promptly to depart from the Confederacy. The next letter is from Mr. Benjamin to Mr. Mason, dated June 11, and consists briefly in explanation of the course of dismissal of Magee and Crigland.

Benjamin's despatch to Mason relative to the dismissal of Magee and the appointment of Crigland by Lord Lyons as Acting English Consul of Mobile, with direction of the President, has been communicated to Russell Russell, in a letter to Mason, in which Mr. Mason is the sole judge of the conduct of Magee, but he is willing to admit that the so styled Confederate States are not bound to recognize the authority derived from Lord Lyons; but it is very desirable that persons authorized by Her Majesty should have the means of representing at Richmond or elsewhere in the Confederate States, the interest of British subjects who may be in the course of the war grievously wronged by the acts of our soldiers. This has been done in other similar cases of States not recognized by Her Majesty, and would be in conformity with the spirit of the British and the British Union, if arrangements could be made for a correspondence between the agents approved by Her Majesty's Government to reside in the Confederate States and the authorities of such States. Mr. Mason, in reply, says that it is his lordship's pleasure to make this proposition, he doubts not it will receive the favorable consideration of the Government at Richmond.

Deceased Soldier's Claims.

TREASURY DEPARTMENT, Second Auditor's Office, Richmond, Va., Sept. 30, 1863. TO THE EDITOR OF THE SOUTHERN GUARDIAN.—Dear Sir: If you could give the following statement a place in your extensively circulated paper, you would confer a great favor upon hundreds of destitute families in our State:

I have charge of the settlement of all claims due deceased soldiers of South Carolina, in this office and there are some things which greatly delay the settlement of these claims, viz: 1st. There is not sufficient care taken in making out claims according to the forms prescribed, which all magistrates must know. 2d. Claimants and attorneys very frequently neglect to send their address, and we do not know where to write them for information, nor where to send our notices when their claims are settled; and 3d. Officers and others connected with the army, are very often appointed attorneys, which is quite unnecessary, as the army is constantly moving, and they cannot have the time to attend to it. The claimants will get their money just as readily by having the certificates (which are issued from this office free of charge) made payable to themselves, or appoint some attorney at home who can attend to it for them. On account of these defects there are several hundred claims remaining in the office unsettled, for want of proper evidence, and there are a great many claims already settled, but not knowing the claimants and attorney's addresses, they will of course have to be kept in the office.

Hoping that the above statement may assist many in preparing their claims in future, I remain, very respectfully, &c., A. P. BUTLER.

IMMENSE LOSS OF PROPERTY.—It is stated that Edmund McGee, Esq., about eighty years of age, residing near Baton Rouge, La., has been stripped of his immense property by the Yankees. He owned 3200 slaves and twenty-seven cotton and sugar plantations, including a cotton factory, which was worked by 300 of his own hands. A railroad thirty-one miles long, leading to his factory, had been constructed by himself, with a sufficient rolling stock. All the negroes, except about one hundred, have been taken off by the Federalists, his factory ruined, all his plantations desolated, his railroad torn up, and about 5000 bales of cotton were burnt by the orders of Mr. McGee to prevent its falling into the hands of the enemy. His loss in negroes and cotton alone is not less than \$5,000,000.

SUBSTITUTE FOR QUININE.—In the absence of quinine, an effective substitute would perhaps be acceptable to some of your readers. Red paper tea and table salt answer every purpose for quinine. Say a table spoonful of salt to a pint of tea, commencing some hours before chills time, and drinking copiously of the beverage, never fails to keep off the chill. This I have from an intelligent physician, who uses it among the whites as well as the blacks of his own family. Several of his neighbors have employed the same remedy with complete success.

We learn from the Petersburg Express that the citizens of Petersburg have subscribed for Virginia slaves for the men of the 12th and 41st Virginia regiments, and the Express adds: "Mr. Harrison, will take these slaves up to the men on Monday next." This is right, our soldiers cannot cause the enemy of factually without slaves, and there is no surer way of providing them, than for the citizens of each county to see to it that their own soldiers are provided.

Mr. Benjamin, our Secretary of State, in a recent letter thus lays down the law regarding foreigners in a new words. He says: "While the Government claims no military service from foreigners, we have never furnished residence in the Confederacy are bound by law to aid in its defence."

SLAVE LABOR DIVISION NO. 3.

THE Commissioners of the Roads and the Town authorities within the judicial Districts of Fairfield, Lincoln, Lexington, Edgefield, Barnwell, and Orangeburg, are required to call to summon all persons in possession of slaves liable to Road duty, within the limits of their District, to deliver one-fourth of their slaves liable to such duty at the Depots nearest the owner's residence on MONDAY, 16th November next, at 10 o'clock a. m., there to await transportation to Charleston for thirty days' labor on the fortifications.

The aggregate of the calls made in this Division, including the present call, is four months' labor of one-fourth of all the Road hands. In pursuance of the terms of the Act, then, the Commissioners and Town authorities will send out the several slaveholders such an amount of labor as will, when added to that already furnished, make up such a quota, &c., &c., one-fourth of their Road hands for four months' labor contributed in advance under this call will be credited on future calls.

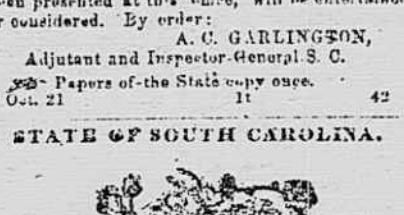

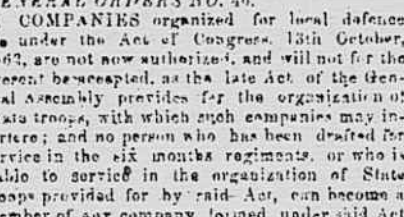
