Whereas experience has demonstrated that the dues to be collected by the Government, and for which Treasury notes are made receivable, are madequate to absorb a sufficient an excessive paper currency; and it is deemed exentiated the interests of the people and of the Government that the right to pay all Government dues in their issues should be waived by the people to a certain extent, and measures be adopted by the Government to redeem or fund the entire amount of the said issues, or so much as shall reduce the sum of the currency to two landred millions (\$200, 000,000) or less. For the accomplishment of this object, the following mousures are recom mended to the country and the Government

this meeting: made to the amount of one thousand millions of dollars, the bonds bearing six per cent. interest—the coupons payable annually in

2. That an Act be passed lerving a tax of sixty millions of dollars, to be collected an nually during the whole period of the said loan, for the payment of the interest on the above bonds. That the said tax shall be paid in coin, and that the coupons of the above bonds be received in the payment of

this tax in lieu of coin.

3. That before the said bonds shall be offer ed for sale in any other manner, they shall first be apportioned among the States of the Confederacy, and that a commissioner be appointed for each State to make known to the ceasity of providing themselves with a sufficient amount of boads to pay this specific tax, and who shall sell at par, in each District, the amount of bonds required ; and that Treasure notes of all issued be received in payment for

the bonds.

Fight on the Rappshuanock.

The Richmond Whig, of the 9th, siys that about 3 or 4 o'clock on Saturday evening, a force of Yankees, a portion of Meade's army, variously estimated at from 15,000 to 20,000, advanced on Hays' Louisians and H ke's North Carolina brigades, who were picketting on the north side of the Rappahannock, near Kelly's Ford. The enemy being in overwhelming force, the two brigades were cut off and overpowered, and most of them taken prisoners. A small mumber were killed and wounded. General Hays, we understand, saved some 600 men, while a sinall number of the North Carol na brigade escaped. We also lost four pieces of artillery, but saved the

horses and equipments.

Our loss in prisoners, is estimated by some at 900 or 1,000, and by others at a much larger number. The numerical strength of the two brigades will scarcely exceed 3,000 men. We learn that Gen. Hays himself was captured at une time, but subsequently escaped. Gen. Hoke is on detached duty in North Carolina, and his brigade-was commanded by the Senior Colonel, whose name we have been unable to earn. Although encountering an overwhelming fires, our men are represented to have fought most gallantly, and piled the ground with large numbers of kirled and wounded Yankees:

The foregoing are substantially the facts as correctly as we could ascertain them from officers and men who left the army yeaterday. We may said that no o cial information has get been received that we have learned in reation to the affair, and nothing through the Associated Press. We hope that further in-formation will show the affair to be less serious than at present reported.
