

At a convention of representatives of the several banks in this State, in which the following banks were represented, viz: Bank of the State of South Carolina, Bank of Charleston, Planter's and Merchants Bank of South Carolina, Bank of South Carolina, State Bank of South Carolina, Union Bank of South Carolina, South Western Railroad Bank, People's Bank, Farmer's and Exchange Bank, Commercial Bank of Columbia, Merchants Bank of South Carolina at Charlestown, Bank of Georgetown, Bank of Charleston and Planter's Bank of Fairfield, the following was adopted:

1. That a new issue of coupon bonds be made to the amount of one thousand millions of dollars, the bonds bearing six per cent interest, the coupons payable annually, in coin.

2. That an Act be passed levying a tax of six per cent on the whole period of the said loan, for the payment of the interest on the above bonds, and that the said tax shall be paid in coin, and that the coupons of the above bonds be retained in the payment of the tax in lieu of coin.

3. That before the said bonds shall be offered for sale in any other manner, they shall first be apportioned among the States of the Confederacy, and that a commission be appointed for each State to make known to the Treasury, and that the said checks be received in payment of the export duty on cotton in the same manner as the coupons on the bonds of the same loan.

4. That all existing distinctions between Treasury notes of different issues and dates be abolished.

5. That the interest on the stock of the fifteen millions loan be paid by checks on the Treasury, and that the said checks be received in payment of the export duty on cotton in the same manner as the coupons on the bonds of the same loan.

6. That a five per cent call loan be established similar to the first or original call loan, and that all Treasury notes be received at the Treasury therefor; and that the present five per cent and four per cent call loans be abolished.

7. That the right of the holders of Treasury notes which upon their face are fundable in five per cent stock, ought to be recognized, and an eight per cent stock, at a short period, be provided for that purpose; and so that all the privileges attached to the original six per cent call loan be re-established.

8. That an increased duty be levied on all imports and exports during the continuance of the war, and that the same be collected in coin or approved bills on England or France.

9. That an issue of Treasury notes be created by the Government and kept separate from the Treasury Department, whose duty it shall be to supply a new issue of Treasury notes in exchange for the amount that may remain in circulation of the present issues, and that the new issues shall express on the face of the bills that the same are receivable in payment of all public dues, except such as are specifically required to be paid in coin.

10. That there should be an issue of bills of a large denomination, say \$1,000, \$5,000 and \$10,000, sufficient to facilitate the transmission of funds and the settlement of balances.

The "Fashionable Sale of the Season" came off yesterday at No. 167 Main street, until lately one of the most attractive gaming establishments of the city. The sale was conducted by Mr. E. S. Pleasant, auctioneer, who appeared with a silver hammer, white kid, white waistcoat, black dress coat, barred pants, his general make up giving eclat to the unusual occasion. The audience of buyers and spectators was large, and composed mostly of that class who are expected to bid not gaze and look on, and see the "most superb piece of furniture mechanical skill ever put together" go for a song. Among the females we noticed the several proprietresses of as many fashionable brothels, one up and the other down town, and they seemed to be bidders in competition for several pieces of furniture very desirable in their estimation. As might be expected from the elegant style of articles exposed, the bidding was lively, and prices were obtained that will do no discredit to the getting fraternity.

An elegant lot of gilt-plated ware brought \$800, and another, surpassing the first in finish and beauty, \$1,200. A stunning rosewood sideboard was "knocked down" at \$900, but the exclamation of "what a pity!" from a bystander caused the sideboard to change hands immediately at \$1,050, or an advance of \$150 on the first price. A second sideboard was sacrificed at \$900, and a third, as the elegant auctioneer said, was "actually thrown away" at \$640. The gorgeous mirrors in the "House of Lords" and "Commons" reflected \$800 apiece under the glass hammer, and the more silver tongue of the elegant auctioneer, who, as he turned away, after the "knock down," said that wasn't more than the value of the naked glass.

Army, for a portion of this District, I respectfully beg leave to say to the Farmers included in my portion of the District that I am ready to receive and receipt for their portion of the Tax in Kind due the Confederate States, at either of my Store-Rooms, at Edgefield S. While I shall endeavor, in the discharge of my duty, to avoid any apparent or real interference with the rights of all persons, nevertheless I will firmly and fearlessly proceed to suppress all Speculative Stores that may be held by parties in speculation. And I hereby warn all such dealers from purchasing supplies above the rates fixed in the Schedule of the Impressing Commissioners for South Carolina.

The surplus proceeds of the country will be required for the successful prosecution of the War, and I earnestly appeal to the citizens of the District, to come up promptly to the support of the Government. We feel assured that, upon proper reflection, any one must feel that it is better to sell to the Government at a fair equivalent than to the speculator at any price.

This is the most trying hour and with us, we certainly will not longer aid and abet the speculator by bringing ruin upon ourselves.

Persons having Speculative Stores for sale will be rendering a service to the country by promptly offering the same to me at Edgefield S. C. All good citizens are respectfully requested to report to me any one known to them who is holding his supplies for speculation, otherwise a great many will evade the duty they owe to their country.
