To make Provision for the Support of the Families of Soldiers from this State in the Confederate and State Service.

Sec. 1. Be it engeted by the Senute and House of Representatives, now mei and sitting in General Assembly, and by the authority of the same, That a lax in kind of two per cent. shall be paid by the producer in any District or parish when r quied by the Boars of Relief thersof: Provided, Test the productrof wheat have leave to substitute for y pounds of flour in place of each bushel of wheat, on the gross amount of all rice, corn and wheat raised and grown in this State. and all foil made by the owners of to:l grain mills during the year 1863; also a tax in kind of five per cent, upon the cross products during the year 1863, of all manufactures within this State, including cotton yara. ex ner and salt, except such articles as ma he manufactured by any person for his or he own use, and not for raise or barter, which said tox shall be collected and paid in the manner bereinafter pre-critical.

Sec. 2. Th t the several Soldiers' Boards of Relief, to consist of not less than three nor more than twenty four, and to be appoint ed as heretofore prescribed by law, shall di-vide their respective Districts or Pari-her into sections equal to their own number, and assign to each Commissioner one of sail sec tions: That for the purpose of ascertaining and collecting the tax in kind of rice, corn and wheat, the said Commissioners shall adopt, as a basis upon which they are to assess said tax, the gross amount each producer has or may return for the year 1853 to the Confederate Assessor, for the tax in kind of the Confederate States, thereby exempting those who are not liable to said tax under the Act of the Confederate Congress. And for the purpose of collecting said tax, each Commissioner its hereby author zed to draw his order for said tax on any producer within the section assigned him, to be delivered to such p rson or persons as may be named, and in such proportion as may be just and properthe order to be the voucher for the payment and in such Districts as may have an excess of provisions under this bill, such excess shall e delivered at such time and place as the Commissioners shall order, after ten days' no tice, for the purpose of being transported to other portions of the S ate: Provided, Tha no person shall be required to deliver his proquee at a distance exceeding eight miles from the place of production. And in the event that any person, so liable, shall fail or refuse to deliver the amount of said tax within the time prescribed, on the order of the Commiss oner, the Commissioner in charge, or some person for bim, shall give information thereof, on outh, to the Chairman of the Board who on receipt of such information, is hereby au thorized to issue an expourion against the delinquent, directed to the Sast of the De tree, requiring him to levy and seize double the amount of the articles in kind for which he was liable, if to be found, and if not, then to levy and collect of his goods and chattles three times the amount of the value of such ix in kind, according to the value fixel by be Confederate Commissioners ! r this State or ar i-les of a like kind.
