The Gate Fight at Dalton.

SPECIAL to the Marietta Rebel. DALTON, Feb. 26th, 10 A. M.—Skirmish commencing yesterday morning at daylight.

Gen. Foster's loss during the recent engagement near Okolond was not exceeded 2,000, while that of the enemy is estimated at 5,000.

Gen. Gholson, with six or seven hundred State troops, arrived and went in pursuit.

Up to this hour no further demonstrations are being made.

Yesterday Stewart's and Stevenson's divisions did the principal fighting.

The enemy were repulsed everywhere and fell back on our right.

By the hospital record, our loss is as follows: Wounded, 151, including one Colonel.

Our cavalry and skirmishers are advancing. All signs of a general engagement have disappeared.

From Tunnel Hill.

The enemy passed through here last night at 12 o'clock. They will probably not make a stand this side of Chickasauga.

Several unburied Yankees were left on the field.

THE VERY LATEST FROM THE FRONT.

All Thursday night the enemy were occupied in removing their dead and wounded.

The enemy fell back yesterday two or three miles.

This afternoon they were five miles beyond Tunnel Hill. Gen. Wheeler pursuing.

Sherman's Expedition.

A gentleman who arrived in Mobile Wednesday night, says the Advertiser and Register, of the 25th, confirms in general the accounts from Mississippi.

He reports on the authority of Yankee prisoners at Enterprise, that Hurlbut's corps is retiring on Yazoo City, and McPherson's on Natchez.

The damage done to the Mobile and Ohio railroad extends from Lauderdale to two miles below Quitman.

Everything at Lauderdale Springs was destroyed.

The Southern road is completely torn up, from Jackson to Meridian.

Our informant states that the enemy committed few depredations upon private property.

Some persons about Enterprise took the Yankee oath, and accompanied them on their retreat.

The brigade that visited Quitman conversed freely of their plans, and inquired if there was not an attack going on upon the forts below Mobile.

They understood that to be a part of the programme, the object being to divert the Confederate forces.

They had no intention of moving against Mobile, and their excursion to Quitman was only for the purpose of destroying the bridge over the Chickasaw.

Gen. Sherman is expected to return to Dalton.

The banks of Charleston have called a meeting of the Banks of the State.
