SAVE YOUR MEAT.

We urge upon the people of the Confederacy to begin early in the year to economize their provisions, bacon particularly. Of meat, few people have more than half allowance and they ought not to have any more, and don't need any more. The balance should go to the army. We doubt, in fact, whether people who stay at home are entitled to even half allowance of meat, when they can get so many vegetables as are to be had by proper management. But what we say is, save your meat. Don't go to work and eat it all up by June, and then have no meat at all. Make a nice calculation, divide it out properly, and run it through the year, so as to have a little all the time. When you eat up what you have now, it will be impossible to get any more for love, or money.

RAISE HOGS.

Now is the time to feed and attend well to the pigs which came last fall. At twelve or fourteen months old, you will have to, kill them, and make your meat, next winter. By p oper care, you can make them weigh from 100 to 200 pounds, at the age mentioned. The Tax Bill. An Act to lay additional Taxes for the Common Defence and Support of the Govern-

SEC. 1. The Congress of the Confederate States of America do enact, That in addition to the taxes levied by the "Act to lay taxes for the common defence, and to carry on the Government of the Confederate States," approved 24th of April, 1863, there shall be levied from the passage of this act, on the subject of taxation hereafter mentioned, and collected from every person, co-partnership, association, or corporation, liable therefor, taxes as follows, to wit:

I. Upon the value of property, real and nersonal and mixed of every kind and descrip tion, nor hereinafter exempted or taxed at a different rate, five per cent. Provided, That from this tax on the value of property, employed in agriculture, shall be deducted the value of the tax in kind delivered therefrom, as assessed under the law imposing it, and delivered to the Government: Provided, That no credit shall be allowed beyond five

II. On the value of gold and silver wares and plate, jewels and watches, ten per cent. III. The value of property taxed under this section shall be assessed on the basis of the same, or similar property in the neighborhood where assessed in the year 1860, except in cases where land, slaves, cotton or tobacco have been purchased since the first day of January, 1862, in which case the said land, slaves, cotton and tobacco so purchased, shall be assessed at the price actually paid for the

same by the owner. Src. 2. On the value of all shares or interests held in any banks, banking company or association, canal, navigation, importing, exporting, insurance, manufacturing, telegraph, express, railroad and dry dock companies, and all other joint stock companies of every kind, whether incorporated or not, five per

From Miscissipple We gather the annexed news from the Selma Mississippian : ...

The victory of Gen. Forrest, over Grierson was nost complete. Grierson had got down as far as West Point. Forrest made arrangements to surround and capture him. Grierson suspected something, and made a retrograde movement. Forrest pursued, and the fight commenced at Okolona, and continued to the vicinity of Pontotoc. The pursuit would have been kept up still further but for the worn out condition of the horses in our command.

The road for many miles was strewn with arms, haversacks, dead Yankees, and everything else which formerly belonged to the Yan ses. Their wagous were all left behind. Buggles and carriages which they had stolen were left with fires built in them, but farther on they were so hotly pursued that they didn't have time to take this precaution; but left the vehicles unbarmed with the traces cut. The number of killed, wounded and prisoners was very great-our loss small. General Forrest fought the battle with about 2,000 men-the reinforcements expected by him did not ar rive in time. The enemy had three times his number. Gen. Forrest led most of the charges

This victory of Gen. Forrest prevented the junction of the large column of cavalry and mounted infantry under Grierson and Smith with Sherman at Enterprise, and thus compelled the retreat of the whole invading forces nd the savage desolation of a still greater por-

Among the forces of Grierson, which lately received such a signal defeat in North Missisippi, were a large number of Dutch and other foreign mercenaries whose outrages upon the unarmed citizens and defenceless women of the region through which they passed, is said to be without a parallel in the history of the war. Everything of value that they could lay their hands-on was either stolen or destroyed; jewelry was ruthlessly torn from the persons of ladie amid the jeers and tounts of the savage vagabonds, and family relies, of no value to any one but the owners, were destroyed with a fiendish delight.

As an evidence of their brutality, we are informed that a Mr. Jarman, a highly respectable and gallant gentleman residing in the neighborhood of Aberdeen was captured and shot by them. After he was dead, the fiends severed his head from his body, quartered him and left his remains hanging by the roadside! Their excuse for the hellish act was that Mr. Jarman and a few others had fired on them in their passage through the country, and was, therefore, a bush-whacker. The ra-cals received their reward when they met Forrest.

The citizens of Columbus, Mississippi, have resented Gen. Forrest with a fine horse, as slight token of their feelings towards him for his recent victory.

FIRE IN EDGEFIELD DISTRICT .- Between one and two o'clock this morning, the kitchen attached to the premises of Mr. L. M. Churchill, (of the firm of Churchill & Johnson, of this city,) residing in Edgefield District, one and a half miles from Hamburg, was entirely consumed, together with its contents. It was with great difficulty the dwalling house was saved. The fire was accidental. The loss is estimated at \$3,000 .- Augusta Chronicle, 4th.
