"Yesterday evening, General Hill attacked the enemy's infantry, which had broken through a portion of the line beld by our artillery on the Squirrel-Level Road, and drove them back. Gen. Hill reports that they were severely punished, and 400 prisoners captured. "Hampton, operating on Hal's right, also drove the enemy, capturing two stands of colors, about 500 prisoners, including four Colonels and thirteen other officers.

"Early reports that all the enemy's cavalry has retired towards Harrisonburg, and that there is new no enemy south of North

River. "Echels reports that the passage of the Watauga by the enemy was resisted from noon of the 29th till dark of the 30th. On Devault's Road the enemy was routed by Cosby and Duke, and driven in the direction of Jonesboro. At Carter's Station they were repulsed by General Vaughan. "Colonei Gitner is operating ag inst a body advancing up Sandy River.

More Fighting at Petersburg.

RICHMOND, Oct 1st, 1864. The following is a special dispatch from the Evening Whig of to-day:

Bernside corps advanced across the Vang-han to the Squirrel-Level road, yesterday, and dislodged our forces from the breastwork o : Peebles farm, four miles from the city, and distant one mile and a-half from their former lines. Our forces resisted strenuously, but were overwhelmed until Hampton checked and drove them back. The battle progressed horly, but favorably, and the enemy were driven back to the works on Peebles farm, when darkness closed further hostilitie-Our forces captured 1,200 prisoners, among

them several colonels and other field officers Our forces were flanked by superior namebers and were compelled to retreat with the loss of one gan and eighty killed, wounded and prisoners. After this advantage, the cu emy pressed forward in the direction of the Boydtown Plank Road, one mile, but were mer on Robt. H. Jones plantation by Wilcox. Most of the prisoners have arrived in town-

The Yankee loss was very heavy. Ours you fully known, but comparatively slight. .. Some fighting this morning. The enemy hold the captured works.

SECOND DISPATCH. PETERSBURG, Oct. 1-5 o'clock p. m. The enemy giter taking our brezstwork last night pressed forward some two miles until met and driven back upwards of a mile by our forces. Early this morning our forces again attack

captured this place this morning, with thir-teen hundred officers and men. fairy wagons and ambulances, five hundred horses, two trains of cars loaded with quartermaster's and commissary stores, with a large quantity of small arms, and two pieces of artillery. My troops are in fine spirits. My loss five killed and twenty-five wounded.
