Another Gleam. An intelligent gentleman in town has allowed us to read an interesting letter just received by him from Charleston. The writer says: "I am satisfied, from all I see here, that there is much more behind the political scenes than we are aware of. The largest minded men here are rapidly showing off their Exchange and Coin, and all are on tip-toe of expectation. The French Consul is reported to have told Mr. G. that the Maximilian Government had been recognized at Richmond, and intimated that his return for this civility, France would very soon recognize the Southern Confederacy."

Senator Hunter of Virginia, Vice President Stephens, and Judge Campbell of Alabama, have been appointed commissioners to go to Washington to confer with the authorities of the United States Government on the question of peace. They will leave tomorrow.

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Yankee Gunboat Destroyed. CHARLESTON, Jan. 27. The Yankee gunboat Dia Chany got aground in the Combahee yesterday. Our batteries opened upon her and set her on fire; she burned to the waters edge; all the crew except one Lieut. and five men escaped; the prisoners were brought to the city to-day. They report that the monitor sunk off Sullivan's Island recently was the Petasco, only five out of a crew of 300 were saved, all the rest were drowned. Nothing important from below.

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The True Spirit. RICHMOND, Jan. 27th. The 53d Va. Regt., Pickens' Division, has unanimously adopted a series of resolutions, declaring their purpose to fight for liberty and self Government as long as the Southern Confederacy can furnish cartridges, and to every dishonorable offer of peace or submission made by the enemy, will reply with the crack of the rifle and shouts of defiance.

Gen. Butler, and his Veterans. Gen. M. C. BUTLER, with two Brigades of his 5th Division, arrived in Columbia ten days ago. He has under his command three Brigades, Gen. YOUNG's, Gen. DEANX's, and that of the late Gen. DUBOIS. Of these three, Gen. DEANX's is left in Virginia. We hear that the two Brigades which have come on, have been ordered to Midway, the first station this side of Branchville—on the S. C. Railroad. Gen. BUTLER and his men are heroes accustomed to victory, and fully determined to do their whole duty towards the deliverance of the South. All South Carolina is jubilant with hope at their arrival.
