DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR. Washington, D. C. Aug. 26. Hom. George B Elmonds, Clermont, Iowa :.

DEAR SIR : Lunve just received cour lester of the 21st inst., stating among other things, that the Ucion State Convention of Iowa has adopted as a plan in its platform a recommendation in favor of negro suffrage; that the Copperhead Convention has indored President Johnson's policy for the reor ganization of States, assum agit to be in opposition to negro suffrage; that this is, in opinion, the issue joined betw-en the two parties in lows; that heretofore the Union party has derived valuable nid from me in support of its principles; that you regret, however, to observe a nowspaper report of a speech re-cently made by me, as you think, in antagon ism with its present principle and policy, which gives you pain.

In reply, I have to say, that if your opinion was well founded, it would be a cause of greater pain to me Iban to yourself; but I beg leave respectfully to sinte that you misappre hand the position of President Johnson, and my own as well as that of the Union party at largh. The real question at issue, in a na tional point of view, is not whether negroes shall be permitted to vote, but whether they shall derive that authority from the nation a Government or from the State Governments

respectively.
President Johnson maintains the doctrible that the Constitution of the United States does not confer on the Federal Government the right to interfere primarily with the quetion of suffrage in any State of the Usio : that the question properties and property be decided by Congress, when Scholer

members present heleselves to dmission to seats in that body under the branse of the Const tution, which mak a cach House the exclusive judge of the qualifications and elcotions of members; and that other clause of the Constitution of the United States, which pro-vides that "the United States shall guarantee to every State in the Union a republican form of government."

I infer that if any State should adopt a law on the subject of suffrage, which would clear ly show the State Government to be often than republican, it would be the duty of Congress to reject applicants for seats, and adopt whatever legislative remedies would in their judgment be necessary to carry out the guaranties of the Constitution.

That the State of Iowa may take steps o extend the right of suffrage, is not, as it seems to me, in conflict with this policy, and, consequently, those who support the policy of the President on this subject are not in antag onism with the platform of the Union party of lows.

The Union party of that State propose that the State shall modify its own Constitution so as to include as electors, persons who have not, under its present provisions, the right to vote: This, as President Johnson maintains. a State may do, but that the National Gov-ernment would have no right to require Iowa, or any other State, to modify its own Constitution, on this or any other subject, when United States.

is submitted to the people, if it should be so submitted by the Legislature, I would vote to extend the right to all classes of persons possessing the requisite intelligence and patriotism to be intrusted with a participation in the management of public affairs. State or National, without regard to their nationalit., as I do not believe that the liberty of any ciass of people can be considered safe who are to be permanently deprived of the exercise of this right.

I do not disguise these opinions; you man therefore make what use, of this letter you may deem proper. I have the honor to be.

PROCLAMATION

BY THE PROVISIONAL GOVERNOR OF SOUTH CAROLINA. .



EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT S. C., WHITEAS a securing conflict of jurisdiction having arises between the civil and military au-therities of Fouth Carolina, under the Provisional Government of the State; and whereas Major-General Gilmore, nommanding the Department of South Carolina, having sought on interview with me. 33 Provisional Governor, in t e presence of Major General Meade, commanding the Atlantic States; and whereas all matters giving rise to the seeming conflict were adjusted and arranged with the consent and approval of Majer-General

Meade: Now, therefore, I, BENJAMIN FRAMPTON PERRY, Provisional Governor of the State of precisin and make that the terms of this arrangement are as follows:
"That in all eases where freedmen or persons of
color are concerned, the Courts of the Prevest
Marshals shall have exclusive cognizance to try and adjust them, for the present; and that all other cases shall be heard and adjudicated by the civil courts, municipal authorities and civil offistill too case.
