**Health for Children.**  
There are as many children die in cities as in the country, and half the children born do not reach ten years. Such a result could never have been intended by the wise and kind Maker of us all. A different result might be brought about by the exercise of the reason which is implanted in all parts, and which, if properly cultivated and practised, in the light of our time, would soon work a wonderful change in infantile mortality.

1. Children should sleep in separate beds, on mattresses of straw or shucks of corn.  
2. Require them to go to bed at a regular early hour, and let them have the fullest amount of sleep they can take, allowing them in no case to be waked up.  
3. Except a rug beside the bed, there should be no carpet on the floor of their chamber, no bed or window curtains, no clothing of any description hanging about, no furniture beyond a dressing table and a few chairs, no standing fluids except a glass of water, and nothing at all in the way of food, plants, or flowers. In short, a chamber should be the cleanest, driest, coolest, lightest and most barren room in the house, in order to secure the utmost purity of air possible.  
4. Make it your study to keep your children out of doors every hour possible, from breakfast until sundown, for every five minutes spent in joyous play increase the probability of a healthful old age.

5. Let them eat at regular hours, and nothing between meals; eating thus, never stultify them; let them partake of plain substantial food, until fully satisfied. Multitudes of children are starved into dyspepsia. The last meal of the day should be at least two hours before retiring.  
6. Dress children warily, woolen flannel next their persons during the whole year. By every consideration, protect the extremities well. It is an ignorant barbarism which allows a child to have bare arms, and legs and feet, even in summer. The circulation should be invited to the extremities; warmth does that; cold repels it. It is at the hands and feet we begin to die. Those who have cold hands and feet are never well. Plenty of warmth, plenty of substantial food and ripe fruits, plenty of sleep, and plenty of joyous out door exercise, would save millions of children annually.—Hall's N. Y. Jour. of Health.

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**To Destroy Flies.**—To one pint of milk add a quarter pound of raw sugar, and two ounces ground pepper; simmer them together eight or ten minutes and place it about in shallow dishes. The flies attack it greedily, and are soon suffocated. By this method, kitchens, &c., may be kept clear of flies all summer without the danger of attending poison.

**Raw Meat and Spirits to Cure Consumption.**—An English paper prints the following:—"M. Foster proposes to cure all cases of consumption by the administration of raw meat and spirits. Although his method of treatment has not been long employed by Continental physicians, considerable testimony has been borne to the great success which has attended its employment. The new treatment has now been tried satisfactorily in two thousand cases of phthisis. The raw meat is reduced to a pulp, mixed with sugar to conceal its unpleasant flavor and administered in doses of one hundred to three hundred grammes per day. The alcohol (of the strength of twenty degrees Baume) is given in doses of one hundred grammes a day."
