It shields officers from acts commit ted in the discharge of their duty, and de clares that all officers shall be presumed to have acted under orders. The bill was recommitted to the Committee, with the privilege to report at any time.

The same Committee reported a bill de claring it the rule of all the United States Courts that persons guilty of treason, murder, bribery and other felonies, or had given aid, comfort or coursel to the enemies of the United States, or had engaged in the rebelion, shall not be allowed to practice in said Courts.

A detachment of fifty men proceeded to the place, but soon found that the negroes were determined to resist. Capt. Brandt then proneeded across the river, went to Mr. Barnwell's place, and at first saw nothing but a few women and children. He read his orders to them, and said that he came to them as a friend and not to fight them. Soon thereafter, the detachment was surrounded by three variety of Lowgrapers to suit the varied tastes of or four hundred armed negro men and women, the men keeping to the re ro the women and children. Some of the negroes got in the rear of the soldiers behind a fence, and, when discovered, they had their gung pointed through boles in the fence, and bearing directly on the soldiers, Discovering this, the captain judiciously determined to withdraw backs," send in an offer to Mr. Walker. 
