Stevens favored the repeal of the clause requiring a majority of registered voters. The delegation thought that would do, but suggested a law empowering the Convention already called to establish provisional governments immediately.

Stevens said he had drawn up a bill with two or three beneficial provisions. One was to have the majority affirm or reject the constitution. Another that the present convention should be an organizing body.
