THE FATAL CARD.

Some years ago the Mississippi River was famous for its "floating palaces," as the large steamers plying between New-Orleans and the ports above were called. Those fine boats, were, in many ways delightful; but they never ceased to be objects of dread to timid people, for there was sure to be one or more encounters, between the more lawless portion of the travellers, in which pistolbullets would fly rather too thick for the comfort of a steatly-going people. The cause of such disturbances was generally a quarrel over the gaming table.
