It will be observed that this section does not abridge the right of suffrage. It only disqualifies certain persons from holding office.
If this amendment had been adopted by the
States when first proposed, no one would have
dreamed that it prohibited any person from voting, who was qualified to exercise the right. of suffrage, under the Constitution, as it was before this amendment became a part of it. Now, if we bear in mind that the State Constitution, Section, II, Article VIII, provides that no person shall be allowed to vote or hold office, who is now or hereafter may be disqualified therefor by the Constitution of the United States." Are we not fired to the conclusion, that the right of suffrage is not abridged by the ferms of the Constitution of the State, on account of any participation in the rebellion? Does it necessarily follow, that because a person is disqualified fr in holding office by Article XIV, that he is also disqualified from voting? By no means. This is a case for strict construction. The citizen is entitled to all the privileges that are not taken away in absolute terms, and hence we argue that no person is excluded from the privilege of suffrage in South Carolina, on account of having engaged in the re-bellion.
