Mr. H. H. PORTER, of Miss., gives his method of keeping Sweet Potatoes. We quote from his article as follows: "The potato never spoils unless over-ripened."

They should be managed carefully, so as not to get bruise or skin them. Sort out all damaged ones and place the others in a place that is perfectly dry, and one that can be kept so, and also one in which the potatoes will be secure against chilling at any time during the winter.

If the excess of free water, that is contained in the potato, that inclines it to rot and sprout, and, in this way, so much of it passes off as to reduce it to a sub-water condition that it has no disposition to rot—will not sprout in the spring and will be as delicious as it can be made, and will remain so all summer.

At the time of closing in, permanently, be sure to see that every part of the covering is secure—for if ever they are allowed to fall below a certain temperature, they will be certain to commence rotting, as soon as the weather commences to warm again.
