That afternoon Willis was arrested in Thomson, and at once confessed-his share in the transaction. He also implicated five other young men, Captain C. V. Hamilton, John Ramsey, T. H. Long, George Tutt and Adolphus Roney Captain Hamilton and Mesers. Long, Tut and Roney were taken into custody and kept under guard that night. Sunday morning the prisoners were brought before two Justices of the Peace for a preliminary examination. At the investiga tion, we learn, Willis turned State's evidence, and testified that there had been an organized band in the county, at the head of which was Capt. Hamilton, and of which himself, Long, Ramsey, Tutt and Roney were members. The band had been engaged in several expeditions, on one of which they had gone into South Carolina and robbed the house of a man named Johnson. He said that himself, Ramsey and Roney were the parties who visited Evans' house. These three were committed for trial on a charge of burglary at night, Capt. Hamilton as an accessory before the fact, and Mr. Tutt for the alleged burglary in South Carolina. Mr Ramsey made his escape before arrest, but it was believed he would be caught last night. Capt.
