> An Interesting Letter from Missouri. MIAMI, Mo., Aug. 20, 1872.

Dear Advertiser .- Allow me to string ogether a few items just as they may ome up before me. I and my little family are quite well, and happy. Indeed, if I could find a man here who would confess that he is

not happy. I would advise him to begin at once to seek another State. Last week I took my family out, spent about two days driving across Peketesa plains, and over the rolling prairie of Saline County; and now I feel somewhat afraid to make a simple statement of a call. facts in presenting part of what we saw. This County has not lacked a single shower during this summer. The soil is, I suppose, as rich as land can be, and the most luxuriant grasses grow on all of it, except where they have been prevented by cultivation. Grass-plots, Hemp-fields, and Corn-fields, with here and there a clump of white houses, make untry over which we traveled. The Grass-plots are mowed regularly at the proper time. The Hamp-fields are mowed also or reaped. Let me describe this work as we saw it. A man is driving team of five mules. Three abreast, in ront, and two at a tongue or pole. The

pole and two cast iron wheels, two and a half feet high, make a cart, whose framework seems to have tumbled over to the ground on the left where it drags its lazy ength along, as the cart moves. Inside of this frame-work there seems to be a right brisk machine, if we may guess by the rattling and clapping which we hear. On the eart sits a man, using a long stick with which he forces the hemp to fall properly on the machine. A boy is walk ng behind to see that it slips off the machine properly. These three, the five mules, and the machine do the work, do t rapidly and in good style. The hemp s laid out on the gro, ad in beautiful rows, and there is not one weed of it left standing on the ground. The hemp be ore it is cut appears to be about as tall is the mules, stems of a beautiful golden ellow; and standing apparently much rowded on the soil. I, may tell you something of the work of preparing the oark of this weed for market, when I ave more time, and learn more about it. Now, let me say a little about the corn. and close. Saving fodder is a business too slow for this country. Men go for fodder to those grass-plots where they can use a machine. 
